Scott	 The intersection on Woodside Road is very close to the

	Broadway intersection. This project will eliminate the intersection and construct the flyover allowing traffic to flow more smoothly. Another challenge is the five-legged intersection with East and West Woodside Road north south and Broadway. This is a problematic intersection that's also subject to accidents as well. This also raises safety concerns for bicyclists and pedestrians. There are also multiple slip ramps that are challenging for cars, bicyclists, pedestrians.
	There were previously gaps for pedestrians and bicyclists too
	that is very challenging.
	 There are also planned improvements that are also in the works as well.
	There are 4.2 miles over 22,000 linear feet of bicycle. Bicycle
	improvements is broad, so there's several improvements in such a small area.
	 This project supports multimodal movement from planned Ferry Terminal and seaport.
	 Right now, there's 105 million in funding needed to complete the project. 208 million has been raised so far. And looking at roughly the share will be 77 million in state funding and 25 million in federal funding.
	65% of the funding has been local.
	35% with federal and state funding.

I'm starting to draft of two paragraphs of what the small business association looks like. I want your input with what I have drafted so far. I wanted to run this language by you all. Especially with Middlefield being closely completed: "NFO Middlefield Road small business association is designed to bring small business owners together to form a powerful voice for the community surrounding Middlefield Road and NFO has deep roots in San Mateo County and the business owners are vital to the community and the association is being formed to support the efforts of the owners and their employees. The association is designed so businesses can share UpToDate information, connect with ither business owners and open dialogue for topics that all the small business overs care about in order to gather and share information. We're going to invite the business owners to go through a small survey to understand where they're at number of employees, do they know their landlord, do they have any issues" -the draft. The subcommittee will move forward.

County Executive's Report- Adam Ely

- Middlefield Road update They're almost done. Streetlights won't turn over until they remove all electrical poles about 12 months.
- The Economic Employment Center, along with Job Train, and Renaissance center is a new county owned facility at 3009Middlefield Road. County is doing a lot of moves etc. About to open.
- The event this Friday April 26th and the upcoming event hosted by Casa Circulo, the Children's event. 11am -2pm Kids activities and music.
- DEM also have places for people if the power is out for extended periods of time or overwhelmed by heat. It's a big priority. Libraries are one of the places where we're looking to.
- Measure K announcements close to being final of the climate resilient committees.
 - The city of EPA housing fund project.
 - Roughly 100,000 awards for Legal Aid Society.
 - 100,000 for eviction defense services award for One Life Counseling.
 - Still more than a dozen of awards, with helping families and seniors.
 - Many mental health programs to assist those programs.

Supervisors Report, presented by Connie Franco, Legislative Aide

- Many of the departments of the county, along with the Sherif's Office will be going out to do
 education and outreach to food vendors on Middlefield Road to inform about inspection and
 how to sell their food with the permit. And how to address that.
- We're also opening the district 4 office next to the EEC It'll be opening up next month.
- There's an update on the Tree ordinance we met with Niket and Kelly about the timeline –
 May 13 we'll hopefully receive the daft with that. The week of June 30 there will be a public
 release on the updated ordinance between the weeks of July 8 and 15 they will hopefully
 present with the update. Oct. 28. It'll be brought to the court.
- We're also working on the illegal dumping.
