- II. Approval of the Agenda
 - Approved without objection

- IV. Public Comments, Correspondence, Announcements

- V. Joint Exercise of Powers Agreement Update
 - Director Dhapodkar presented the recommended changes to the Joint Exercise of Power Agreement (JPA). Key points included:
 - The updates include establishing emergency management standards for the San Mateo County Operational Area (SMC OA), which Member Agencies are required to follow.
 - Adopting an all-hazards approach to cover natural, technological, and human-caused incidents, ensuring comprehensive planning and resource flexibility.
 - The Organization is a special district for financial reporting by the State Controller's Office (SCO), requiring annual submissions and audits.
 - Motion by Foster City. Second by Millbrae.
- VI. All Hazards Countywide Evacuation Plan Update
 - The Department of Emergency Management (DEM) has decided to separate from the contractor working on the All Hazards Evacuation Plan. Moving forward, the DEM will handle this project internally alongside an evacuation subject matter expert.
 - The ESC will be kept abreast of the progress.
- VII. Storm Planning
 - Mr. Reynolds presented the Emergency Management Phases in storm planning; phases include Monitoring, Preparedness, Response, and Mitigation.
 - The DEM is tracking seasonal outlooks and conducting training to ensure staff readiness. Over 17,000 sandbags are staged, and local libraries are ready to serve as Community Resilience Centers. The DEM will coordinate with the National Weather Service. The DEM will also facilitate operational area coordination before, during, and after storms.
 - San Mateo and Menlo Park requested that their libraries be involved in the CRC project.
- VIII. Community Outreach
 - Ms. Firpo gave a presentation on Community Outreach, which provided an overview of various community events that the DEM hosted and attended over the past year.
 - She emphasized the importance of providing planning and preparedness materials in multiple languages to expand the DEM's reach in and improve community resilience in communities where English is a second language.

- IX. Director's Year in Review
 - Director Dhapodkar discussed the many milestones that the DEM has accomplished in her first year as Director of the DEM. Some of these accomplishments included conducting and participating in over 20 trainings and exercises, over 17 community outreach and preparedness events, 11 incident responses, and 9 mitigation projects.

- X. 2025 Calendar Approval
 - Director Dhapodkar proposed moving the first 2025 ESC meeting to February to allow Member Agencies time to appoint representatives.
 - The June meeting was updated to be scheduled on June 12th, 2025.
 - Motion by San Mateo. Second by San Carlos.
 - Vote – all in.

 - Council Vice Chair Medina and other Council Members thanked the Members, who will be terming out before the next ESC meeting, for their service to the Council and their communities.

Subject: Strategic Plan Update

SMC Emergency Management 2025-2030 Strategic Plan is nearing completion. The SMC Emergency Management held 7 Strategic Listening sessions with over 175 participants from over 86 organizations countywide. The Plan has been guided by extensive community and stakeholder engagement and a TARGET (**T**raining Enhancement, **A**ctivation of Resources, **R**apid Coordination Systems, **G**ap Assessment, **E**mergency Communications, and **I**tending to Vulnerable Populations) Gap Analysis.

TARGET informs our department's 2030 strategic vision by introducing our "3C Framework" (Connection, Capability, Communication) and the new Emergency Management Partnership Initiative (EMPI), which will launch in March 2025 and will strengthen operational area coordination across 20 jurisdictions and the County. Based on these listening sessions, we have developed a new logo effective March 1, 2025.



We undertook a research-driven evolution to reflect our department's transformation from the Sheriff's Office and civil defense roots to our current role as the County's stand-alone emergency management agency. Our evolved identity supports our core mission: **Building resilience by empowering our communities, strengthening operational capabilities, and coordinating support before, during, and after emergencies.**

From extensive studies in emergency management effectiveness and organizational psychology, we developed an identity system that addresses our community's increasingly complex needs through clear, consistent, and accessible communication. This transformation:

- Enhances trust and recognition during critical situations.
- Supports clear communication during emergency response.
- Strengthens stakeholder trust and community engagement.
- Improves coordination across agencies and jurisdictions.
- Helps reduce cognitive load during high-stress situations.

Final key performance indicators (KPIs) are being developed to measure progress toward San Mateo County's goal of becoming the nation's most resilient county by 2030.

Subject: Director's Update

SMC Emergency Management is advancing several key initiatives in response to ongoing efforts to enhance emergency preparedness and resilience. These include the development of the All Hazards Evacuation Plan (AHEP), the Coastside Resilience Infrastructure Strategic Plan (CRISP), and the range of community engagement activities to boost community preparedness. The updates below outline the progress of these projects, along with upcoming events and opportunities for continued collaboration with SMC Emergency Management stakeholders and partners.

- SMC Emergency Management is progressing with the development of the AHEP, which is expected to be completed by June 2025. We will continue engaging stakeholders and Operational Area partners to gather their input and incorporate feedback into the plan. As part of this project, we will develop a base plan for the Operational Area, while cities/towns and partner agencies will still be responsible for developing their annexes with our ongoing support.

As part of the AHEP project, on Monday, March 10, 2025, SMC Emergency Management will host an exercise with stakeholders and Operational Area partners. During this event, participants will receive training and access to Ladris, an AI evacuation modeling software designed to assist with evacuation planning in their local jurisdictions.

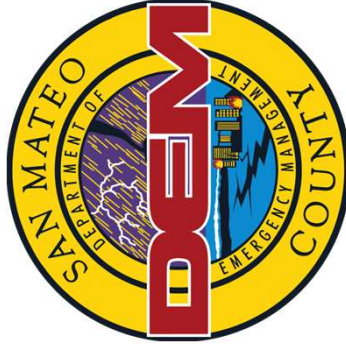
- The Coastside Resilience Infrastructure Strategic Plan (CRISP) project, in partnership with Supervisor Mueller, is nearing completion. A total of 106 submissions from partners have been received, with 22 critical infrastructure projects prioritized. We will host a CRISP Stakeholder follow-up meeting on Thursday, March 6, 2025, to present the CRISP dashboard and share the project's findings.

- SMC Emergency Management remains committed to community engagement in emergency preparedness. We have collaborated with non-government organizations to hold several key preparedness events, including Pizza & Prep, the Coastside CERT Leadership Forum, a Virtual Wildfire Preparation Webinar, the San Bruno Bel Air School Prep-Talk, and the Burlingame Community Preparedness Briefing.

As SMC Emergency Management continues to engage and work closely with stakeholders and the community, we are focused on ensuring the successful completion of these initiatives and fostering ongoing collaboration to strengthen the County's collective ability to respond to future challenges.

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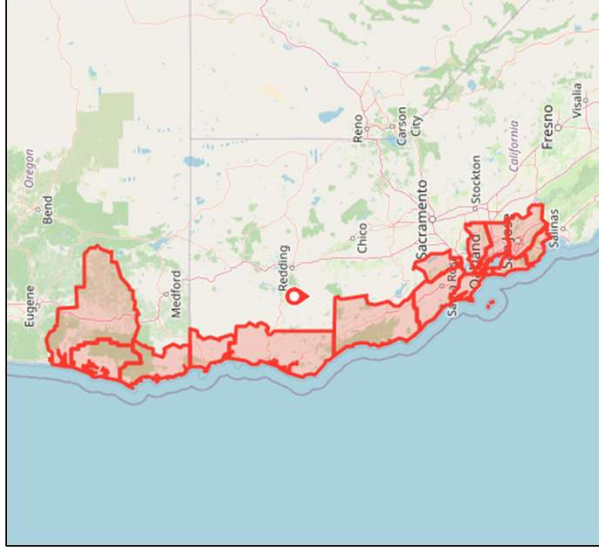
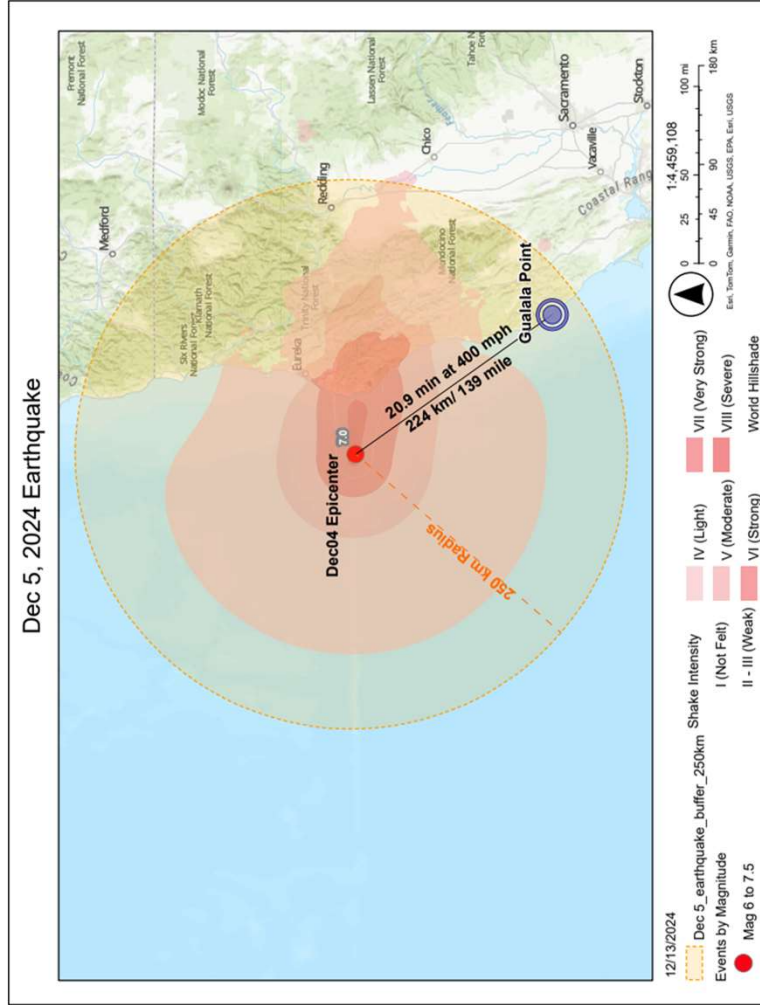

- 20% that an earthquake measuring magnitude 7.5

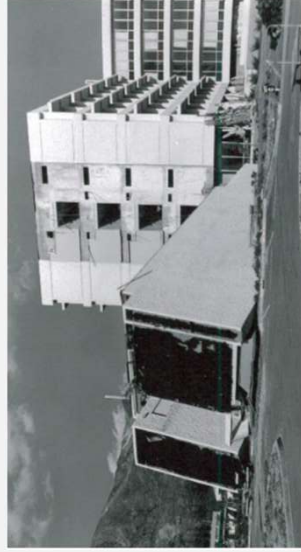


Comparison of Earthquakes in Different Locations



San Fernando (1971), 6.6

- 58 deaths
- 2,000 injuries
- \$553 million in damages



Haiti (2010), 7.0

- ~220,000 deaths
- 300,000+ injuries
- \$7.8B in damages and economic losses



Northridge (1994), 6.7

- 57 deaths
- 9,000+ injuries
- \$20B in damages
- \$49B in economic loss



Morocco (2023), 6.8

- ~2,900 deaths
- 5,500+ injuries
- Cost of damages and economic loss still under assessment



Recent Earthquakes in California

Napa (2014), 6.0

- 1 dead, 200 injured
- \$57.9 million in infrastructure damages

Ridgecrest (2019), 7.1

- 1 dead, 25 injured
- \$5.3 billion in infrastructure damages

Eureka (2023), 6.4

- 2 dead, they had medical emergencies during the quakes and impacts to infrastructure meant the emergency services could not reach them in a timely manner
- Estimated hundreds of millions in infrastructure damages

- Water shortages, boil water notices, residents buying water

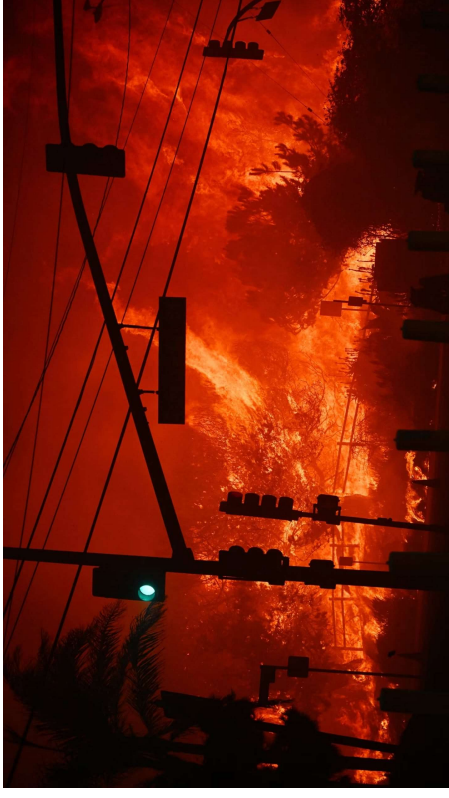
