



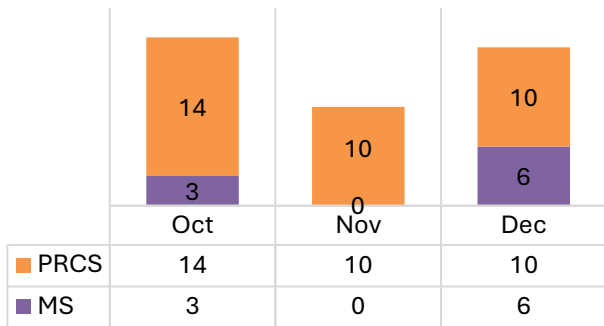

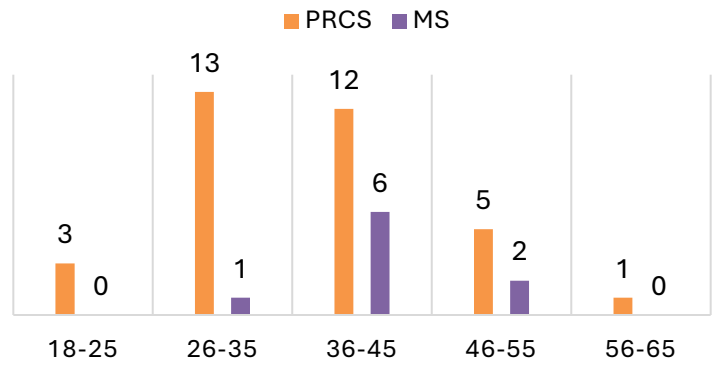

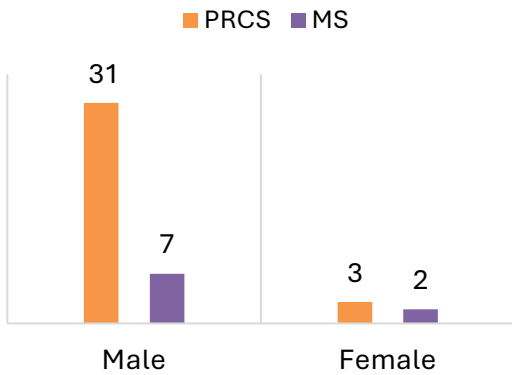
PRCS and MS Released to SMC Supervision



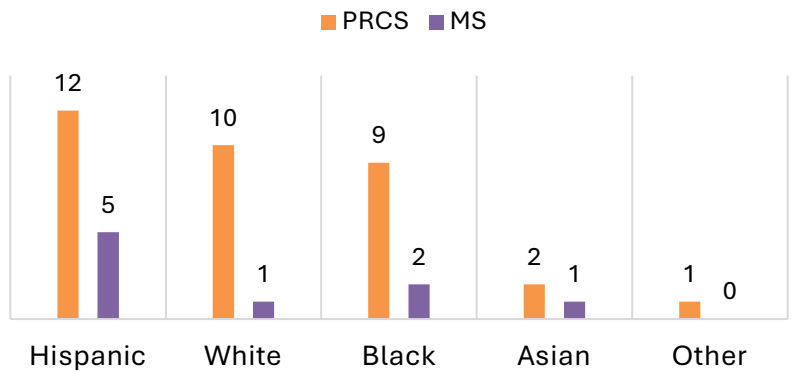

Terminations, Revocations and Flashes

There were twenty-six (26) terminations during the reporting period. Sixty-nine percent (69%) were successful.

In the reporting period, we filed a total of fifty-four (54) revocations. PRCS had all fifty-four (54) revocations. Of the revocations, there were thirty-six (36) New Law Violations. The breakdown by violation category is below:

Generally, the population is reoffending by committing crimes similar to those for which they are on Realignment, namely non-serious, non-violent, non-serious sex related crimes.

Thirty-one (31%) of revocations were for technical violations. Technical violations of supervision are filed when supervisees abscond or fail to abstain from substance use. It is important to note that the Probation Department usually files formal revocations after lower sanctions have been attempted, including flash incarcerations for PRCS cases. However, at times, officers may decide that a formal revocation is more appropriate than utilizing lower sanctions, depending on the circumstances of the violation. Sixty-nine percent (69%) of revocations filed were for new law violations involving property, drug/alcohol related crimes as well as other crimes.

There were ten (10) **flash incarcerations** during this reporting period.

Five (5) cases were **transferred** to another county for supervision.

Recidivism Definition

San Mateo County: Arrest and/or Charges Filed within 3 years of Last Incarceration in San Mateo County, including warrant arrests, PTA/Court Sentence but **excludes** PRCS flash incarcerations/Revocation, 647/849B1 (no charges filed) or dropped charges.

Attorney General: An arrest resulting in a charge within three years of an individual's release from incarceration or placement on supervision for a previous criminal conviction.

BSCC: A conviction of a new felony or misdemeanor committed within three years of release from custody or committed within three years of placement on supervision for a previous criminal conviction.

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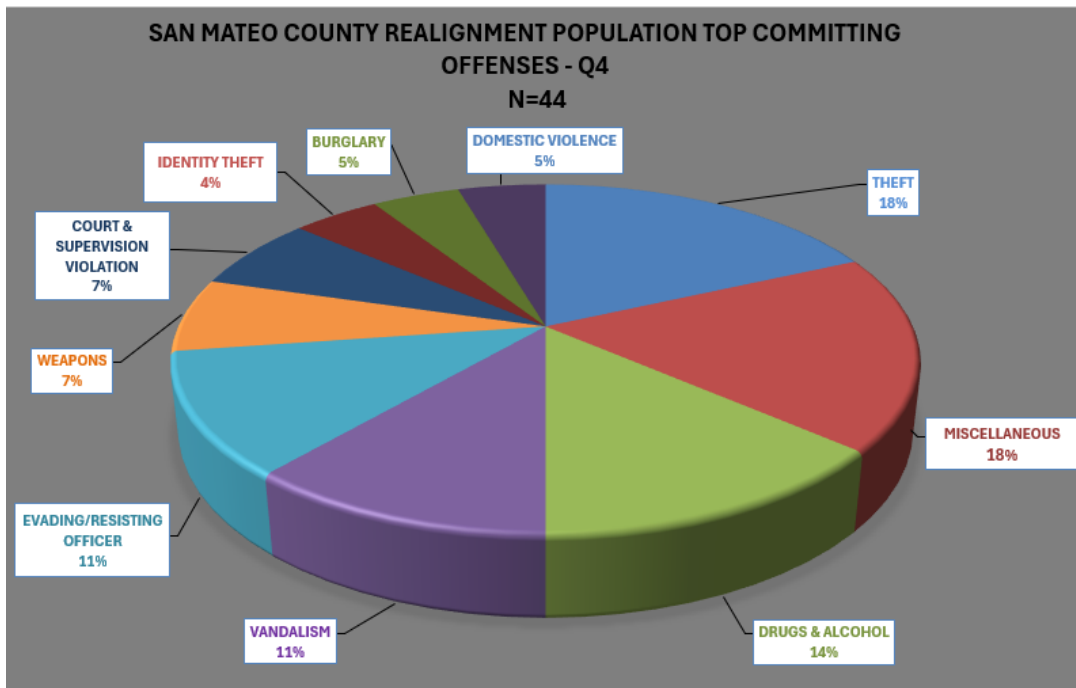
REALIGNMENT BULLETIN CY2025 Q4: OCTOBER TO DECEMBER

Executive Summary:

This quarter, offense patterns among the supervised and in-custody realignment populations in San Mateo County shifted compared to 2024 trends. Previously, drug and alcohol-related offenses were the most prevalent category. In Q4, however, Theft emerged as the leading category (18%). A range of miscellaneous offenses emerged as the second leading offense category (18%), including several not previously observed. Drug and alcohol-related offenses followed at 14%.

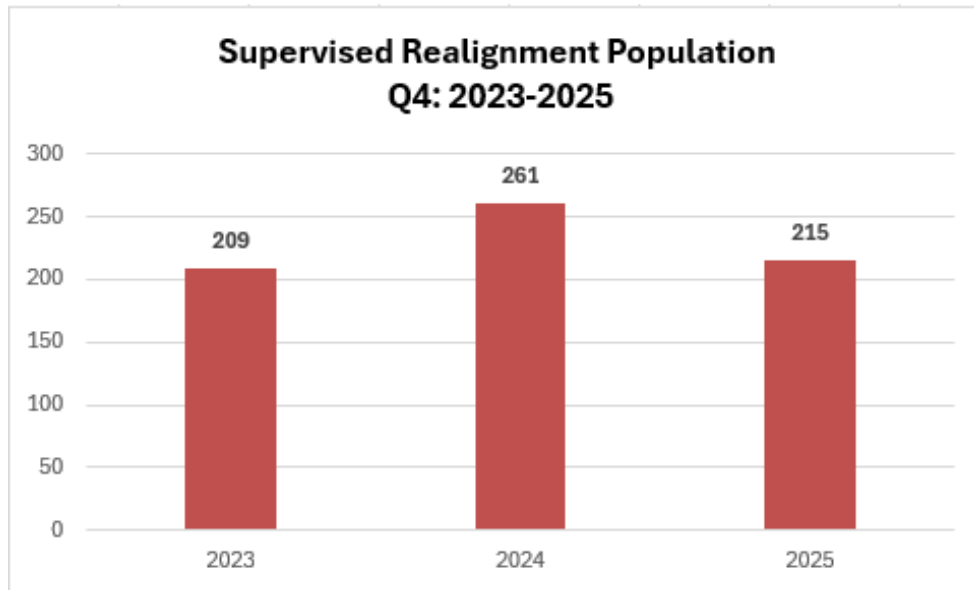
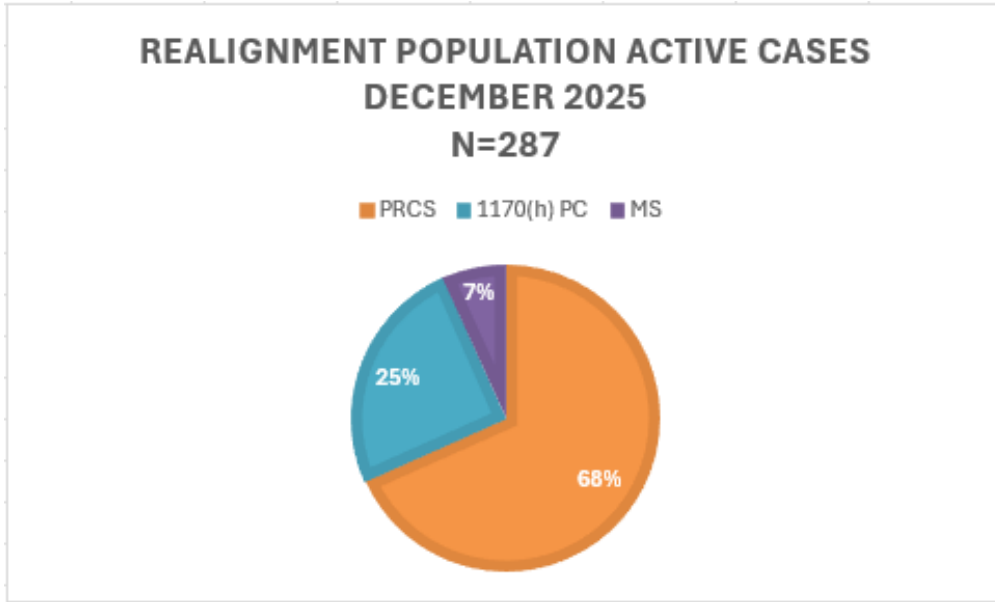
Overview:

During Q4, Theft (18%), Miscellaneous (18%), Drugs & Alcohol (14%), Vandalism (11%), and Evading/Resisting Officer (11%) were the top committing offenses for the realignment population (this includes the new supervised cases and in-custody realignment offenders). Please note, "miscellaneous" refers to a number of assorted offenses that do not amount to any one category. These offenses include but are not limited to: possession of child pornography, unlawfully causing a fire, stalking with a restraining order in place, child abduction (custodial interference), tax evasion on tobacco products, contracting without a license, carjacking, and assault with a deadly weapon. Overall, the total realignment population during Q4 decreased by 2.7% compared to Q4 in 2024.



The data used for this analysis was derived from information provided by the San Mateo County Probation Department and the SMCSO Corrections Division.

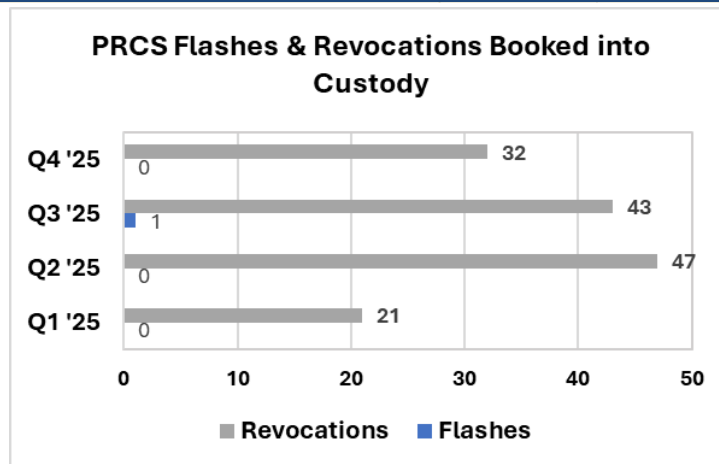

(MSV): Offenders in this population were re-arrested after being released from a PC1170(h) split sentence. Some of these offenders were ordered to serve the remainder of their original sentence and supervision was revoked; others were ordered to serve a portion of their original sentence and were reinstated on mandatory supervision.

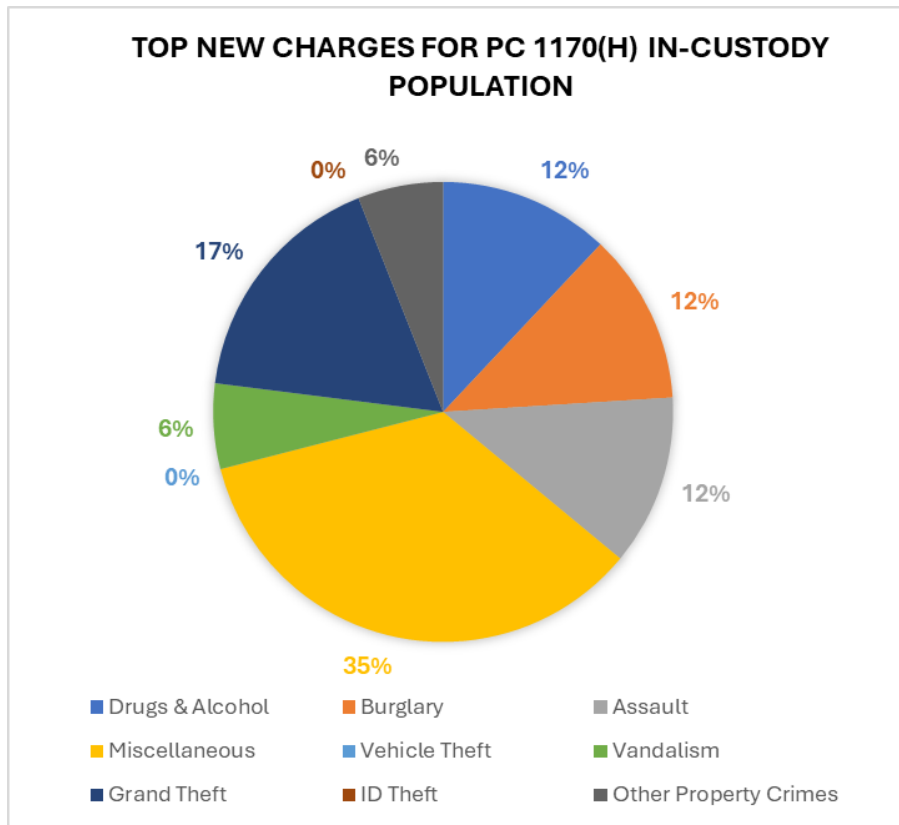
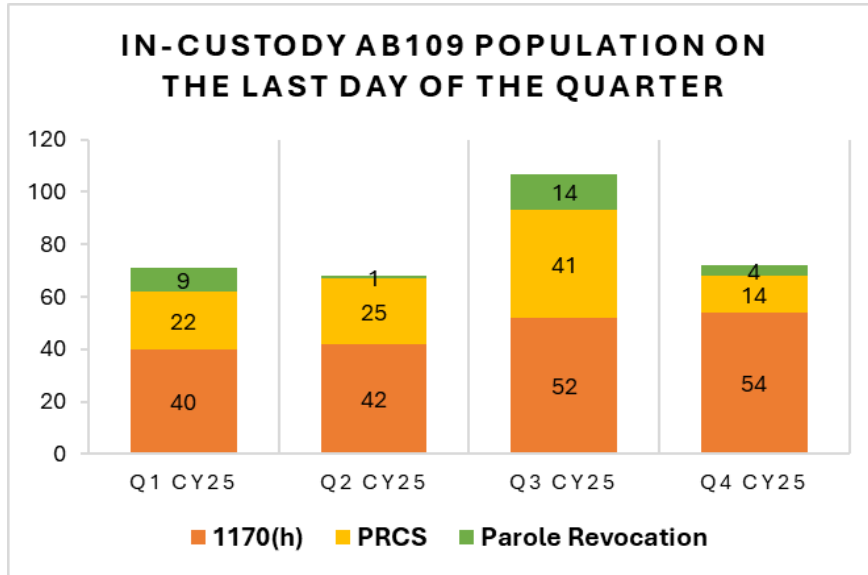

San Mateo County: In Custody (cont'd)

AB109 In-Custody on the Last Day of the Quarter:

On the last day of the quarter (December 31, 2025), the total AB109 in-custody population was 7.8% (72) of the overall average daily population (913), a significant decrease from the prior quarter 11.11% (107) with an ADP of 963.



During Q4 CY2025, miscellaneous and drugs/alcohol comprised the top new charges committed by the in-custody population. Please note that the category "Other Property Crimes" refers to offenses such as elder theft, receiving stolen property, embezzlement, forgery, and larceny. "Miscellaneous" refers to a number of assorted offenses that do not amount to any one category. These offenses include but are not limited to: evading, false imprisonment, stalking, arson, and court order violations.

Service Connect HSA Dashboard

FY 25-26, Q2 (October 2025 – December 2025)

New Intakes

- There were 88 intakes in Q2.
- Intakes in Q2 by program type: 40% AB109, 32% UR, 28% PUR.
- In coordination with Sheriff's Office, 52 virtual intakes were completed in Q2 accounting for 59% of intakes.

Eligibility/Benefits

- There were 23 applications received and processed in Q2: 11 CalFresh, 7 General Assistance, 5 Medi-Cal.
- There were 15 applications approved in Q2: 8 CalFresh, 4 GA, 3 Medi-Cal.
- Denied applications totaled 8: 3 CalFresh, 3 General Assistance, 2 Medi-Cal. Four applications were denied for failure to provide verifications, three for failure to complete determinations, and one was not eligible for benefits.

Training/Employment Services

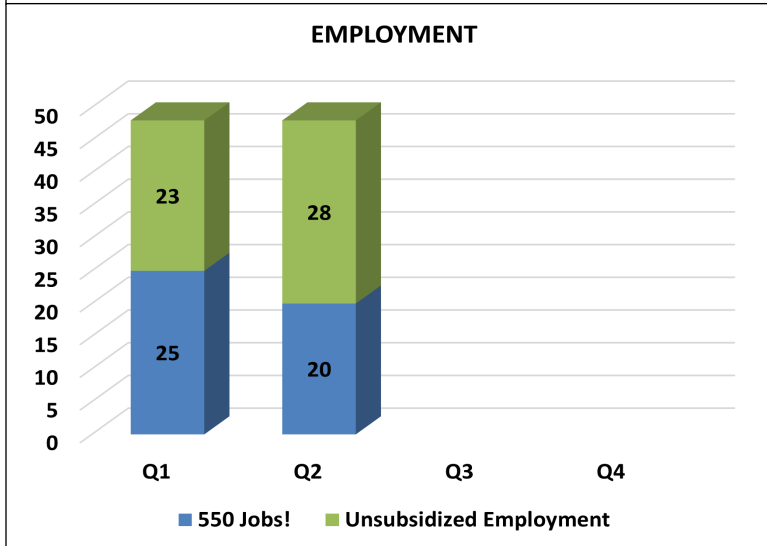
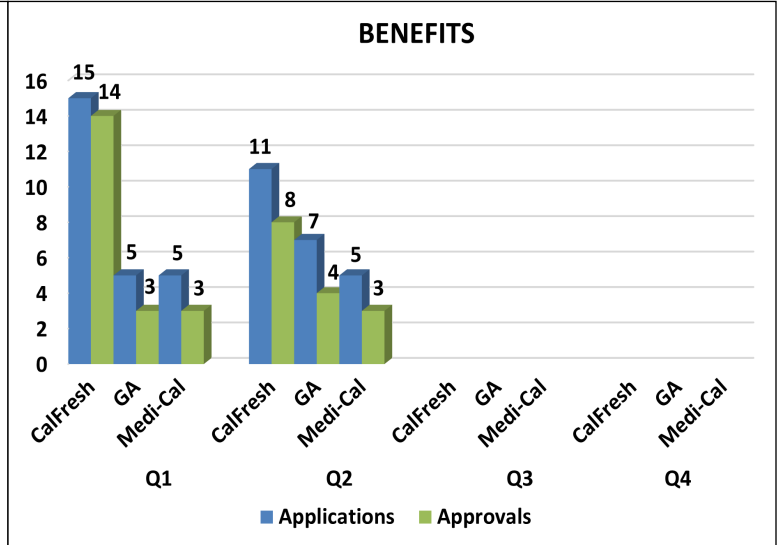
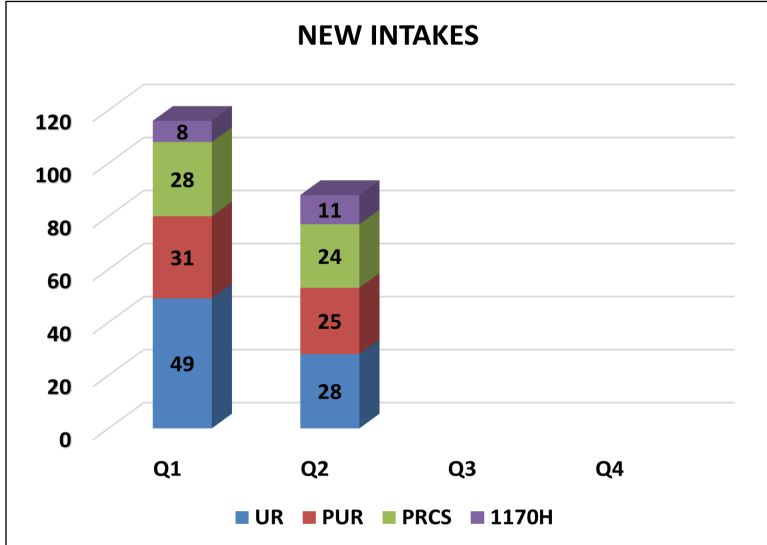
- In Q2, 48 individuals participated in paid training (550 Jobs!) and employment. 550 Jobs! comprised 42% and unsubsidized employment 58%.
- Food Service, Trades/General Labor, and Retail were the top 3 industries that employed individuals in Q2.
- Average wage per hour for unsubsidized employment was \$22.92.
- Total of 50 individuals received job development services in Q2.

Services Provided

- Food assistance was the most requested service in Q2: 350 VRS meals, 17 Safeway gift cards, and 22 food totes were issued serving an average of 25 individuals per month.
- Transportation and communication were the second most requested services: 103 monthly bus passes, 55 bus tickets, 4 phones, and 4 phone cards were issued serving an average of 38 individuals per month.
- Other services provided were personal supportive items. Individuals were provided with 27 hygiene kits, 6 Target cards, and 2 clothing vouchers serving an average of 11 individuals per month.
- In Q2, there were 26 individuals who utilized the motel voucher program and 9 individuals provided with shelter bed placement.
- In Q2, under the Rapid Re-Housing program, 7 households were referred, 8 households maintained active leases, and 2 households successfully exited the program after completing 12 months of subsidy assistance.

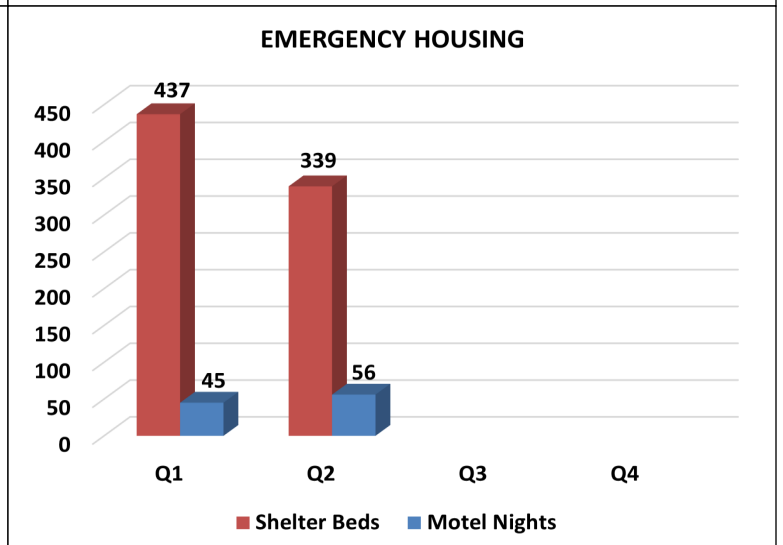
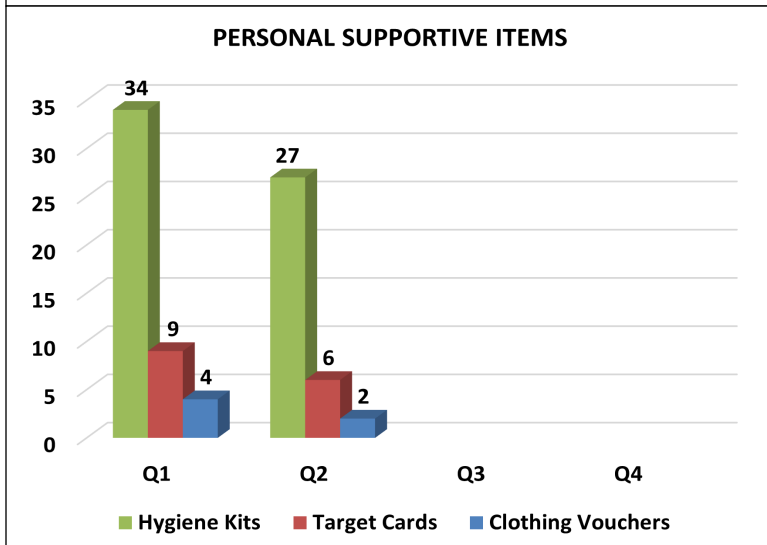
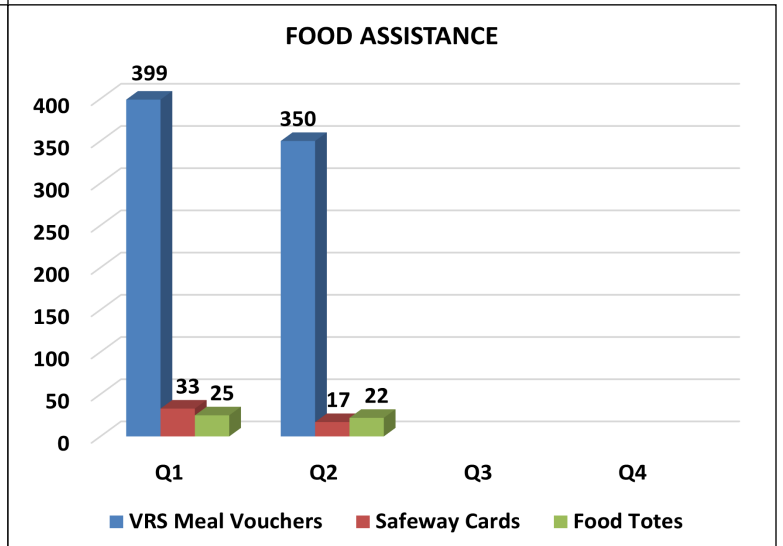
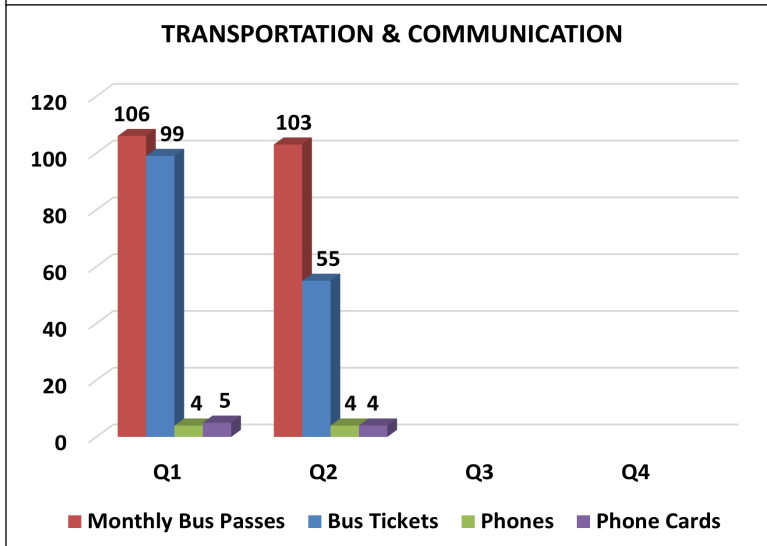
Peer Support Services

- 29 individuals received peer support services in Q2.
- There were 64 peer support check-ins: 40 face-to-face meetings and 24 telephone calls.
- Additional support services provided: 9 warm hand-offs, 4 transportation assists, 1 medical appointment assistance, 9 rapid rehousing referrals.

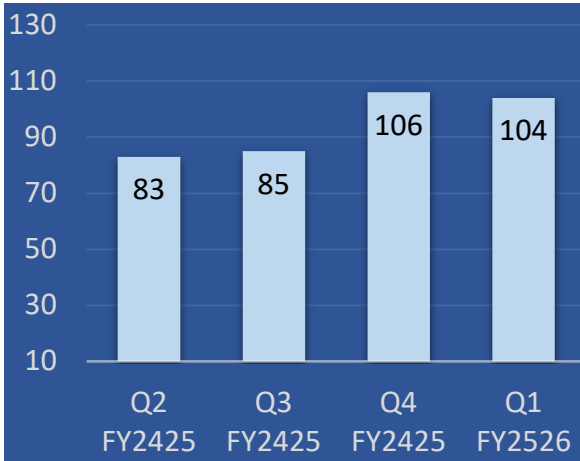

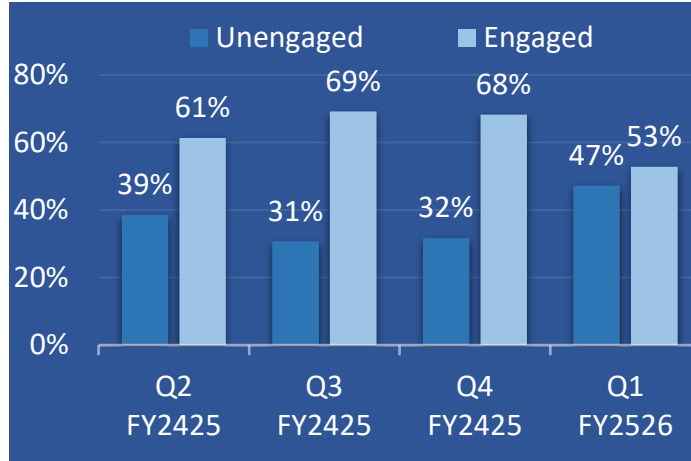

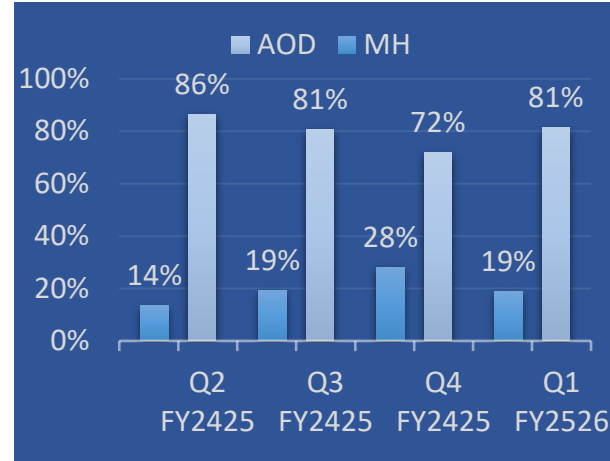
Open Cases w/ a Service



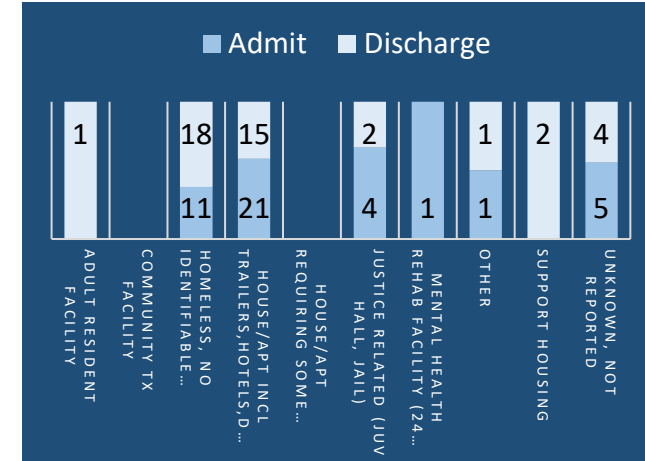
Engaged Participants (≥4 Services)



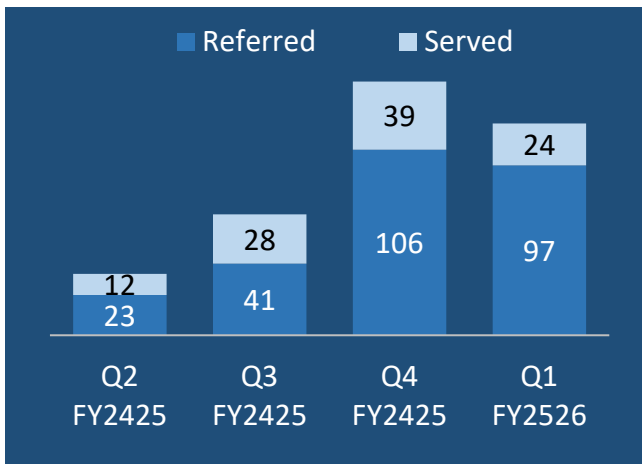
Clients by Treatment Plan Type



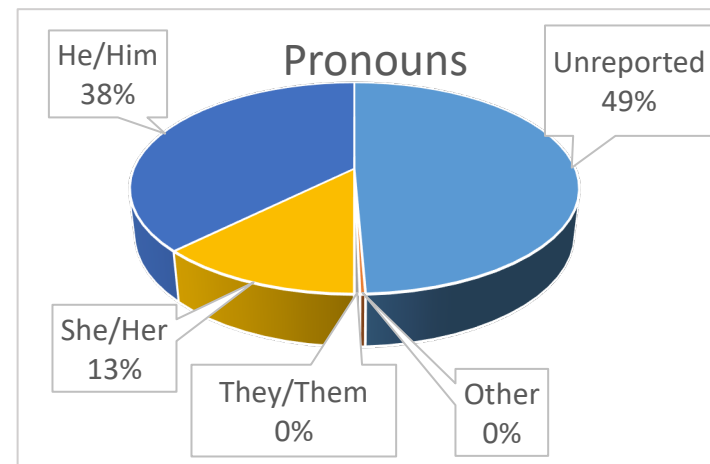
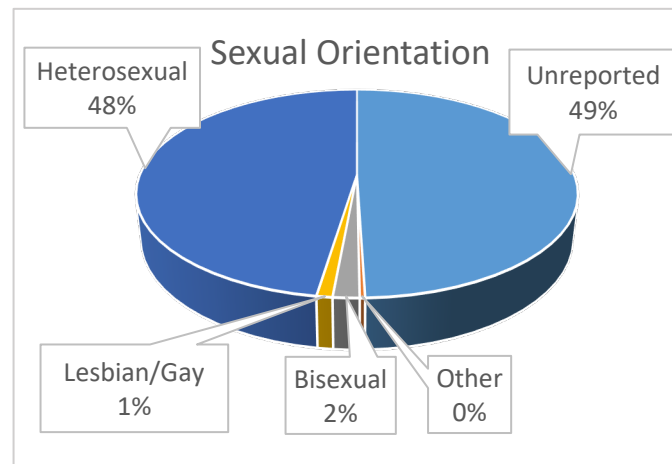
Living Situation at Entry/Exit



Total Referred and Served

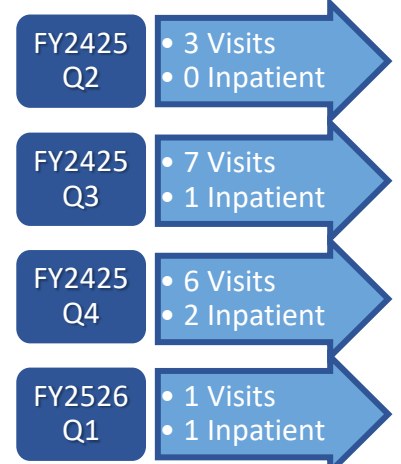

Please Note: The BHRS Service Connect Dashboard is presented one quarter in arrears to present accurate data because submission deadlines are too soon after the quarter close.

AT-A-GLANCE: All Time Total BHRS Referred, Served, Number of Services

The total number of participants referred to BHRS for treatment since July 1, 2017, is 3,572; of these, 2,056 entered treatment and/or recovery plans. (Participants served by BHRS is a lower number than those referred because not all assessments result in treatment). The total number of Service Connect services—including both mental health and substance use treatment services—provided to participants since the inception of the program is 30,338.

Open Service Connect Cases with a Service

This graph represents total Service Connect participants that received at least one BHRS service. The numbers do include participants that continued from quarter to quarter, so a participant could be counted more than once in each quarter if their case was open across multiple fiscal quarters. The Q1 count is 104, which is consistent with the previous quarter.

Engaged Participants with Four or More Services in a Year

“Engaged” is defined as a participant receiving four or more services, meaning the participant has returned to BHRS for multiple appointments for different services, demonstrating the participant is engaged because they actively participate. Engagement rates tend to increase for multiple quarters after the reporting period, as service data becomes more complete.

Percent of Participants with Substance Abuse Recovery Plan or a Mental Health Treatment Plan

This graph presents the percentage of participants who had a mental health treatment plan or a substance abuse recovery plan. Substance abuse recovery plans are historically at a rate of two to one as compared to a mental health treatment plan. However, AOD treatment plans this quarter continue to be higher than that ratio, which represents a significant trend.

Living Situation Upon Program Admission and Discharge

This graph shows the living situations of participants at the time the participant was admitted to the program and then the living situation when discharged from the program, for participants who were discharged in the reporting period. The purpose of this measure is to monitor the service impact on improvement of the living situation of the participant. Q1 shows there was an increase in Homeless living situations for the participants who were discharged during this reporting period, compared to their living situation at admission.

Total Individuals Referred to Service Connect and Total Admitted for Services

Not all individuals referred to the program meet the assessment criteria for admission to the program, so this graph measures the difference between the number of persons referred and the number that are admitted and served for each quarter. The results for Q1 demonstrates that the previous quarter’s increase in referrals was maintained, with a relative decrease in the number served.

Sexual Orientation and Gender Identity (SOGI) Data

BHRS collects SOGI data in five categories at admissions and across the life of a case to inform other levels of government of the needs of all populations. Q1 Sexual Orientation shows nine individuals reporting as non-Heterosexual. Two participants indicated their pronouns are They/Them or Other. These continue to be high counts for both categories.

Correctional Health Services (Unavailable)

Previous counts represented the participants who were screened, medically treated, and referred for mental illness and substance abuse treatment by Correctional Health. Due to a staffing change and transition to a new electronic health record system, this data is no longer available and will need to be re-defined.

Service Connect Cases with PES Counts

A Psychiatric Emergency Services (PES) count is when a Service Connect participant has presented themselves at PES. Those participants that were not admitted are shown as a “visit” and those admitted are shown as “inpatient.” Involvement with PES is only counted if enrolled in Service Connect—counts do not include episodes when subject was not a participant in Service Connect. Q1 showed a large decrease in PES visits and small decrease in hospitalization.

BHRS is continuing to review and improve data methodology for this report.

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
