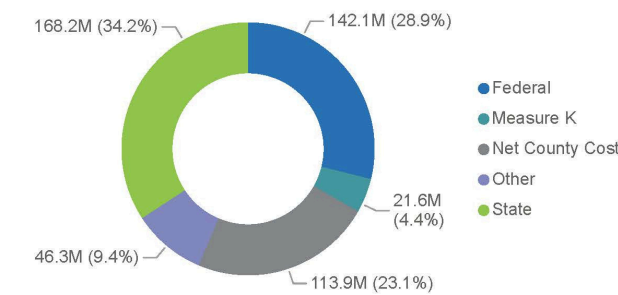

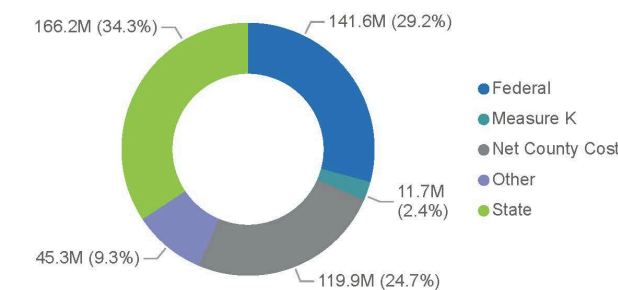
## Budget Summary

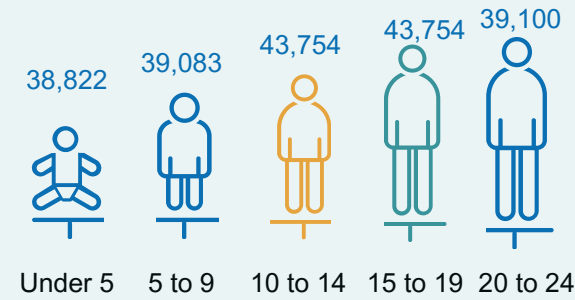

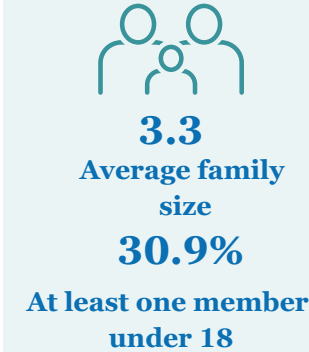

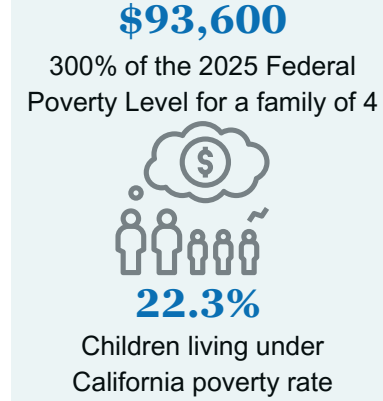
### Age Distribution



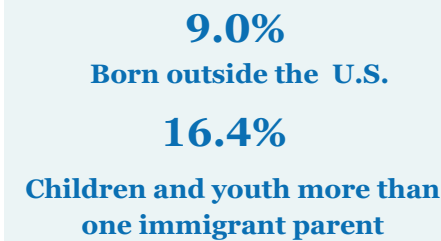
### Family Size



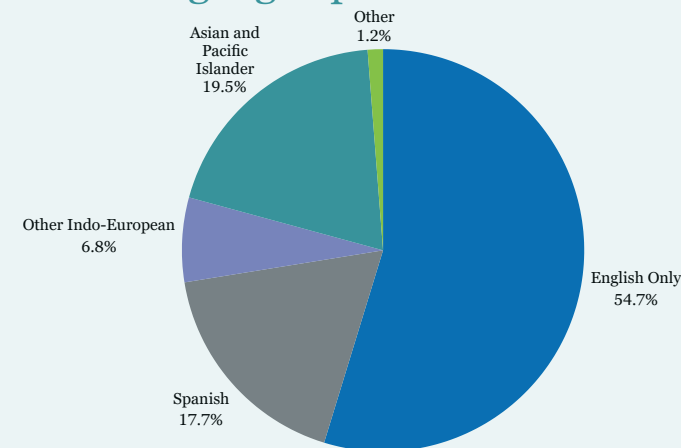
### Poverty Level

## Four Pillars



### Health

Promote Freedom From Injury or Illness, Mental and Physical. Health Encompasses programs, services, preventative measures, and initiatives aimed at ensuring the physical well-being of children.



### Education

Facilitate Learning in K-12 Schools and Other Knowledge Institutions. Education incorporates educational programs, and resources crucial for fostering growth.



### Wellbeing

Improve Overall Quality of Life Through Social Services. Wellbeing encompasses investments in mental health, social services, and programs that enhance overall quality of life.



### Engagement

Provide Assistance and Extracurricular Opportunities that will Broaden and Enrich Life Experiences. Engagement reflects the importance of recreational activities, cultural enrichment, and community involvement, recognizing the pivotal role in a child's development.

## HEALTH HIGHLIGHT



### Black Infant Health

Black Infant Health works to improve African American birth outcomes by providing culturally equitable Case Management, Health Education, Client Support Groups and other supportive services, to mitigate the historical and systemic racism and inequities that has contributed to disparities like higher Maternal and Infant death rates. Briana Spotwood, a native of East Palo Alto, has had 2 children in Black Infant Health and has participated in both our Prenatal and Post Partum Groups. She has also had numerous friends and family who participated in the program. Briana credits Black Infant Health with helping her better understand her role as a Black mother.

## WELLBEING HIGHLIGHT



### Therapy Animals and Music

At the heart of the San Mateo County Sheriff's Activities League (SAL) is a mission to strengthen bonds between local youth and deputies. San Mateo County SAL partnered with @NationalPAL to host an engaging and informative workshop for more than 25 local teens at Cañada College in Redwood City, as part of the Orgullo y Educación (OYE) Conference. The session highlighted how animals (including our very own Therapy K-9s), stuffed animals and music can offer comfort, support emotional well-being and provide therapeutic benefits.

San Mateo County SAL was honored to collaborate with Dr. Galen Duncan from National PAL who led an informative discussion about how music can be a form of therapy. Each participant went home with a new stuffed animal of their own and tangible ways they can incorporate music into their daily routine to help calm stressors.



## EDUCATION HIGHLIGHT



### Youth Climate Ambassadors

Emma Kim joined the Youth Climate Ambassadors program in October 2024, eager to take part in local climate action. Over seven months, she engaged in readings, discussions, and a student-led Community Impact Project. Knowing buildings and transportation are major greenhouse gas sources in San Mateo County, Emma helped design a clean energy workshop for young children. Her team created educational materials, secured a venue, and taught hands-on activities to inspire sustainable living. Through the program, Emma built confidence, leadership, and public speaking skills, culminating in two successful workshops in Pacifica. In recognition of her work, she presented her project to the County Board of Supervisors for Earth Day 2025. The experience has deeply influenced Emma's interest in sustainability and shaped her vision for future climate advocacy.

## ENGAGEMENT HIGHLIGHT



### Junior Naturalist Camp

San Mateo County Parks provides two (2) day summer camps at Fitzgerald Marine Reserve for local Community Based Organizations serving youth in underserved areas of San Mateo County. Youth attending these trips are between 7 and 12 years old and experience a variety of activities and lessons over the course of camp to explore and learn about the marine and coastal environment.
