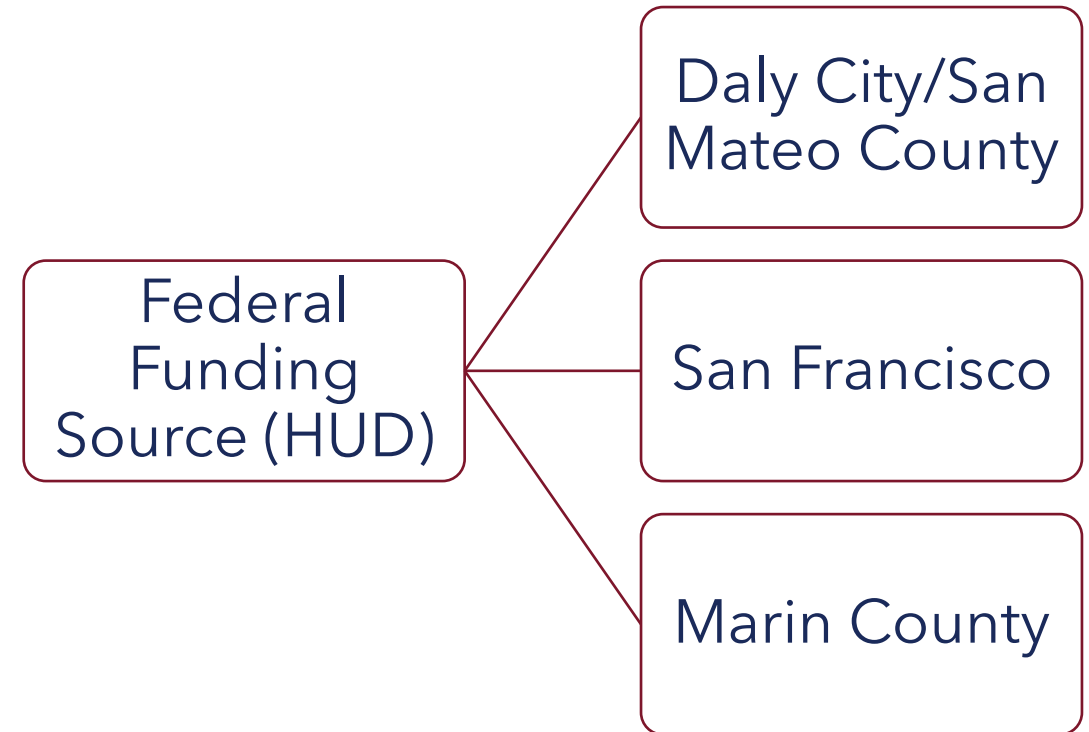


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Overview of the Continuum of Care Program

What is The Continuum of Care?


The Continuum of Care (CoC) Program is a federal funding program from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) that **supports local communities in addressing homelessness.** It is a competitive grant program that funds local organizations to provide housing and services to people experiencing homelessness.



What Does the CoC Program Do?

The CoC Program is designed to:



- **Support a community-wide response to homelessness**
- Help people quickly exit homelessness into stable housing
- Expand access to services, treatment, and mainstream resources for people experiencing homelessness
- Promote long-term stability and self-sufficiency for people experiencing homelessness

CoC: Continuum of Care Program

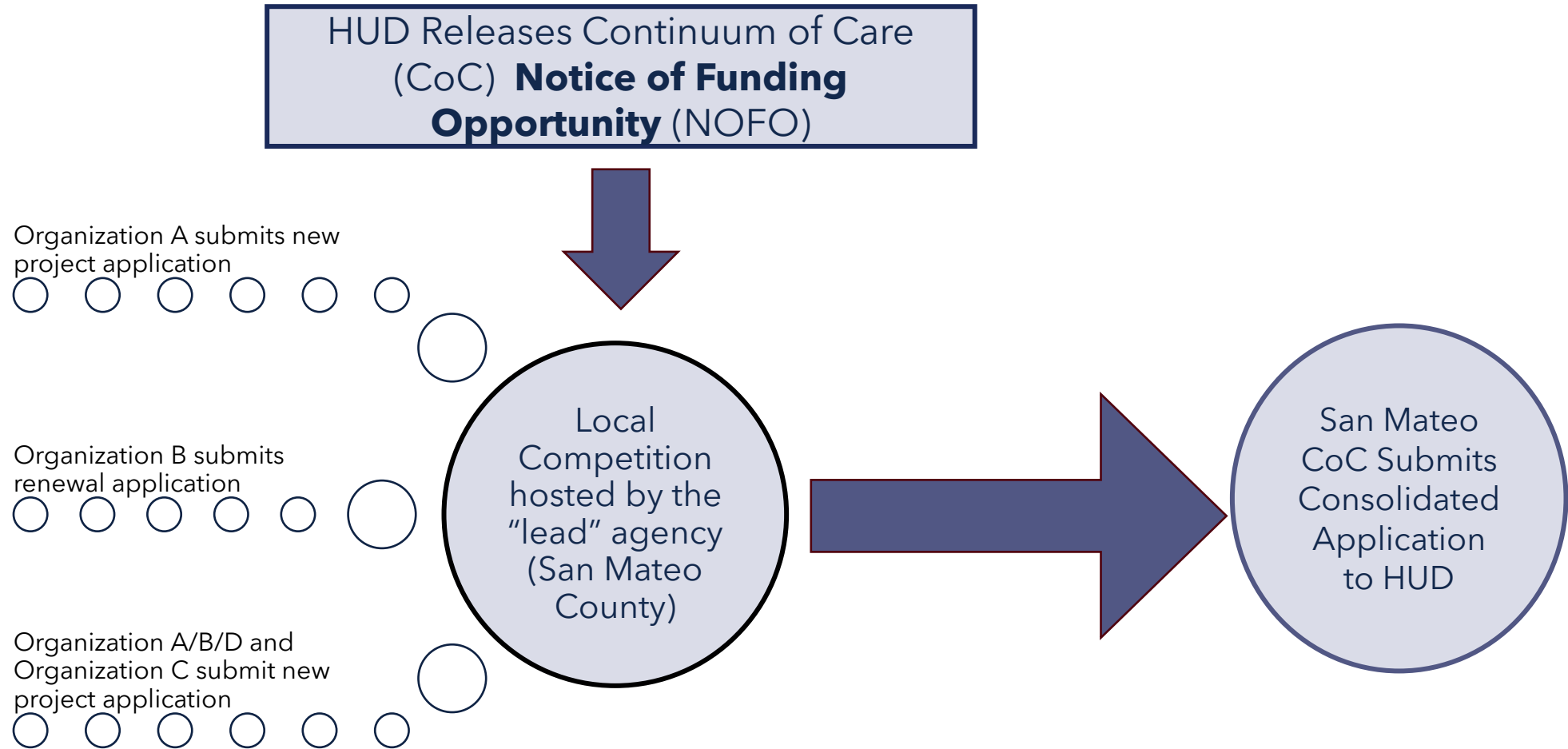
The CoC Program is designed to promote communitywide commitment to the goal of ending homelessness by providing funding for efforts by nonprofit providers and State and local governments and promoting access to and effect utilization of mainstream programs by homeless individuals and families.

Who Can Apply for CoC Funding?

Eligible applicants typically include:

- Nonprofit organizations (including faith-based organizations)
- Local and state governments
- Tribal governments and organizations
- Public agencies and institutions
- **Existing and new providers may apply.** Eligible providers can apply together.

How Does CoC Funding Work?



What Types of Projects are Funded?

CoC funding supports a range of housing and service models, including:

- **Transitional Housing (TH)***. Time-limited housing (up to 24 months) with supportive services.
- **Supportive Services Only (SSO)***. Services such as outreach, case management, recovery and substance use treatment services, workforce development services, and childcare.
- **Rapid Re-Housing (RRH)**. Short-term rental assistance and supportive services.
- **Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH)**. Long-term housing assistance with intensive services.

****Due to federal and local priorities, the CoC will only accept new applications for TH and SSO in the local competition.***

What Types Of Projects Are Funded? (Continued)

Examples of project concepts that could be eligible and competitive in 2026 CoC NOFO

Transitional Housing (TH)

- Transitional housing programs with enhanced on-site supportive services (e.g., job training, employment readiness workshops, job placement assistance, vocational training etc.)

Supportive Services Only (SSO)

- Workforce specialists accompany street outreach teams into encampments
- Assist individuals with obtaining IDs, Social Security cards, work permits, and other employment documentation as part of outreach, shelter, or housing staff.
- Provide workforce development services to people experiencing homelessness (on-site at shelters, navigation centers or off-site).

2026 Federal Priorities for CoC Program Funding



01

Emphasis on **on-site** treatment, recovery, employment, and self-sufficiency services to address “root causes of homelessness.”¹

02

Project designs highlighting **mandatory services and connections** to behavioral health care, employment, and other mainstream systems.

03

Emphasis on “rebalancing” the CoC Program to support a broader range of project types and interventions, including **Transitional Housing** and **Supportive Services Only** projects.

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What to Expect From the Local Competition as a New Partner or Applicant

Estimated <u>minimum</u> available funding for New Projects in 2026	\$2,400,267
Estimated available funding for Domestic Violence Bonus Funding in 2026	\$827,676

Important Requirements of CoC Funding: New Project Applicants



Providers applying for CoC funding must meet programmatic and administrative requirements associated with federal grant funding. New applicants can expect to:

Submit a **New Project Application**

Secure and document cash or in-kind **match contributions**.

Register and maintain accounts with SAM.gov and HUD's e-snaps system.

Comply with **federal reporting, monitoring, and grant management requirements**, including data entry in the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS).

Ways to Apply for CoC Funding

There are a few different ways that a new partner/ applicant can apply for CoC Funding:

- Apply as a **new applicant** with a new project application for a new project or expansion of an existing eligible project.
- **Partner** with an organization (such as one with CoC Funding experience) to submit a joint application, where one organization is a recipient and the other is a subrecipient or subcontractor.
- Provide **in-kind services** or resources (e.g., physical space, case management, substance use treatment services, etc.)
