

San Mateo County's two-year budget for fiscal years 2017–2019 allocates more than half a billion dollars for programs that directly benefit children and their families. San Mateo County is committed to supporting youth and children and to improving the quality of life for every family in our community. We are dedicated to providing the more than 160,000 County residents under age 18 with the resources and support they need to become healthy, productive members of our community.

San Mateo County's Shared Vision 2025, a community-generated blueprint for the County's future, sets our community sights on achieving a Healthy and Safe, Livable, Prosperous, Environmentally Conscious, and Collaborative community by the year 2025. In the following pages, you will find details of selected programs and services organized by these outcome areas.

BILL OF RIGHTS FOR CHILDREN AND YOUTH OF SAN MATEO COUNTY

Adopted by the Board of Supervisors in 2008, the Bill of Rights for Children and Youth serves as a statement of commitment and vision for providing services to children and youth in San Mateo County. This document, written in collaboration with youth, declares that the young people of our County hold specific rights by virtue of their age and stage of mental and social development. These rights include the following opportunities for every young person to have:

A healthy mind, body, and spirit that enable them to maximize their potential.

3

Essential needs — get nutritious food, shelter, clothing, health care, and accessible transportation.

5

Access to a 21st century education that promotes success in life, in future careers, and a love of life-long learning.

Employment opportunities with protections from unfair labor practices.

A voice in matters that affect them.

A healthy attachment to a parent, guardian, or caregiver, and an ongoing relationship with a caring and supportive adult.

4

A safe and healthy environment, including homes, schools, neighborhoods, and communities.

6

Training in life skills that will prepare them to live independently, be self-sufficient, and contribute to their community.

Freedom from mistreatment, abuse, and neglect.

10

A sense of hope for their future.

THE FOLLOWING CRITERIA ARE USED TO DEFINE CHILDREN, YOUTH, AND FAMILY PROGRAMS:

- "Children" and "youth" are defined as persons under age 18. However, some programs for Foster Youth serve clients up to age 21. When program spending for youth under age 18 cannot be separated from spending on clients up to age 21, the entire program cost is included.
- Spending for programs where adults receive money based on the presence of a child or youth are included.
- Spending for programs that benefit the general public, even if those programs benefit children and youth, are not included.
- Programs that indirectly benefit children and youth are not included.
- Capital projects are not included.

MEASURE K

In November 2016, San Mateo County voters passed Measure K, a countywide half-cent sales tax extension to support essential County services. After consultation with the public, a significant portion of Measure K funds have been dedicated to programs serving children, youth, and families: boosting school safety, improving libraries, raising literacy, and improving foster care and juvenile mental health services.

IMPROVE SCHOOL

Improve school safety by expanding the County's School Resource Officer Program, which assigns deputies to schools to maintain a secure learning environment. School Resource Officers also provide security and crowd control for school functions and educate students and families on crime and drug prevention.

ENHANCE LITERACY

Enhance literacy and learning by providing \$2 million for library repairs and redesign as well as new library facilities throughout the County.

SUPPORT SUMMER READING PROGRAMS

Support Summer Reading Programs at 32 public libraries and the San Mateo County Library Bookmobile. The County provides literacy opportunities to over 58,000 children, teenagers, and families by promoting the enjoyment and importance of learning through a variety of enrichment activities.

PROVIDE EARLY INTERVENTION

Provide early intervention to prevent mental illness, emotional disturbance, and substance abuse among children and youth. These efforts involve cooperation between the County Health System, Probation, Human Services Agency, schools, and school districts.

ASSIST FOSTER CHILDREN

Assist foster children, who are some of the County's most vulnerable residents. Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) is a non-profit that trains volunteers to mentor and advocate for individual foster children. Mentors facilitate academic performance and personal skill development through activities including writers' workshops, clothing design camps, and sports leagues. Measure K funds helped CASA serve over 320 foster children in Fiscal Year 2016-17.

THE BIG LIFT

The Big Lift is a partnership between the County of San Mateo, Silicon Valley Community Foundation, and the San Mateo County Office of Education to help the 50 percent of San Mateo County children who are not reading proficiently by third grade. The County of San Mateo has committed \$15 million of Measure K funding to The Big Lift. The effort involves a collaboration of more than 300 educators, nonprofits, businesses, government, and foundation leaders working together to transform early learning.

The Big Lift offers high-quality preschool with additional programs focused on reducing chronic absence, ending summer learning loss, and encouraging families and the broader community to participate in activities that promote literacy.

Starting in the four target communities of South San Francisco, Jefferson Elementary, Cabrillo, and La Honda Pescadero, The Big Lift has provided nearly 900 children with new or enhanced preschool spaces, implemented summer learning programs, and engaged parents in activities that support their child's education. The Big Lift plans to expand to other communities in the future.

HEALTHY AND SAFE COMMUNITY SHARED VISION 2025

A healthy community is a safer community.



One of the prime measures of a healthy community is access to preventative care and health care services, beginning with pre-natal care and lasting through all stages of life. San Mateo County is dedicated to providing children, youth, and families with access to medical care, as well as community support for healthy lifestyles.

PRENATAL TO THREE PROGRAM COLLABORATION WITH BLACK INFANT HEALTH PROGRAM

The Prenatal to Three Program was experiencing a low level of engagement with the County's African American population. As a way to make services more accessible and address the needs of this underserved population, Prenatal to Three has been collaborating with the Black Infant Health Program (BIH). The BIH team members share a very close connection with African American mothers and their children in the community and have been working to increase utilization of mental health support. Collaborating with BIH has provided a space to connect face to face about at-risk clients and develop strategies to better support this population.

PROBATION PARENT PROGRAMS

The Probation Parent Program serves parents of children 12 years old and older who have been referred by the courts and probation services. The Parent Project® (www.parentproject.com) is a parent training program designed specifically for parents of strong-willed or out-of-control teens. The curriculum teaches prevention, identification, and intervention strategies for destructive adolescent behaviors. Parents learn how to increase communication, create positive parent-teen relationships, improve children's school performance, intervene with substance abuse, and apply techniques for active listening and discipline.

FAMILY REUNIFICATION PROGRAM


In August 2017, the Sheriff's Office introduced the Family Reunification Program at the Maple Street Correctional Center. The goal of this program is to help maintain the critical bond between a mother and child while inmates are in custody.

After completing an internal screening and application process, mothers in custody for non-violent offenses are able to have contact visits with their children who are 7 years old and younger. Studies have shown children in this age range benefit the most in their development from positive parental bonds.

This program is a collaboration between the San Mateo County Sheriff's Office and the Service League of San Mateo County.

Elena is a Spanish speaking mother of five who receives nutrition education and food assistance vouchers through the WIC Program. WIC staff noticed she was distressed and learned that her son, who had medical and dental needs, had been detained by immigration. WIC staff connected Elena with a Community Worker, who guided the family to immigration help, medical and dental services, and to the Early Headstart Program for the younger siblings. Elena shared with WIC staff that she is pleased with the help provided to her family.

SHERIFF'S ACTIVITIES LEAGUE (SAL)

The SAL programs are designed to build stronger communities and promote a positive relationship between members of the Sheriff's Office and the youth and families of our communities. Focus areas include: Building the Bond between Deputies and Youth; Health and Wellness; Academic Achievement; and Leadership Development and Mentoring.

Ignatius Hayer, SAL's 2017 Youth of the Year, along with six other high school students from the SAL program, traveled to Houston, Texas to aid in the relief program for victims of Hurricane Harvey. They worked in neighborhoods that were devastated and assisted in clearing out homes, including carpets, wood floors, and sheet rock walls.

WOMEN, INFANTS, AND CHILDREN (WIC) PROGRAM

The San Mateo County Health System helps women become confident parents of healthy kids. WIC mothers learn to eat healthy while pregnant or breastfeeding, learn to shop for and cook healthy meals, and get benefits for nutritious foods. Families also get referrals for other help they might need, including prenatal care, immunizations, and dental care.

LIVABLE COMMUNITY SHARED VISION 2025

Livable communities connect children, youth, and families to housing, opportunities for cultural and personal enrichment, supportive social services, and transit systems.



San Mateo County is committed to creating happier and livable communities. For families, livable communities provide opportunities to work close to home – reducing commute times – and provide easy access to rail, bus, and carpool options. The result is that more families are able to spend more time together or participate in volunteering, cultural or civic affairs, or simply enjoy the arts in lively downtowns.

DAD AND ME @ THE PARK

Dad and Me @ the Park represents a large group of community resources committed to supporting healthy fatherhood and male involvement for the benefit of children. Sponsored by the Human Services Agency and First 5 San Mateo County, the event is a fun, free, outdoor educational and resource fair that engages hundreds of children, fathers, and families from all throughout San Mateo County.

A significant portion of funds budgeted for children and youth programs are used to improve families' economic self-sufficiency. San Mateo County offers an array of programs that help youth find jobs and ensure that the necessities of nutritious food, clothing, and shelter are met.

DEMOCRACYLIVE! IT'S YOUR FUTURE - SHAPE IT

democracyLIVE! is the San Mateo County Student Poll Worker program where students have the opportunity to get an inside look at the election world. Student Poll Workers are critical members of the Election Day team and provide support to Elections Staff, assisting voters and participating in polling place operations. It's a great opportunity to get an inside look at how American democracy works.

SUPPORTED TRAINING & EMPLOYMENT PROGRAM (STEP) FOR EMANCIPATED FOSTER YOUTH

The Supported Training & Employment Program (STEP) for Emancipated Foster Youth is an internship program sponsored by the Human Services Agency and the Human Resources Department. The purpose of the program is to introduce former foster youth who are at risk of underemployment to "the world of work." The program focuses on four areas:

- 1. Job readiness and skills building
- 2. Job shadowing and employment coaching
- 3. Hands-on, paid work experience in one of several possible County departments
- 4. Transition planning

JOBS FOR YOUTH PROGRAM

Isabela Acenas, daughter of immigrants from the Philippines and a Burlingame High School graduate, exemplifies the spirit of the County of San Mateo Jobs for Youth program. As a high school student, Isabela attended a Jobs for Youth workshop and gained confidence in her volunteer, work, and education experiences. She learned to persevere and find her purpose in the face of adversity. She has received an award for her work with the House of Love Project, which she founded for children in Manila's impoverished farming and underserved migrant community, in addition to creating the Philippine Consulate's Youth Coalition where she was involved in bringing unity to Filipino-Pacific Islanders in the Bay Area.

With the help of the Al Teglia Jobs for Youth Scholarship, she now attends New York University and is double majoring in Environmental Science and Global Public Health. Isabela's journey to successful and fulfilling work, volunteer opportunities, and academic experiences is an important reminder of the power of encouragement and youth employment pedagogy in building confidence and skills in San Mateo County youth.

ENVIRONMENTALLY CONSCIOUS COMMUNITY SHARED VISION 2025

NATURE EXPLORATION

The Parks Department encourages youth and their families to explore the natural environment through a variety of events and programs that are hands-on, educational, and activity based.

SOUTH SAN FRANCISCO BURI BURI ELEMENTARY SCHOOL GOES GREEN WITH LUNCH COMPOSTING

The San Mateo County Office of Sustainability partnered with South San Francisco Buri Buri Elementary School for the launch of its new composting program. The program teaches students how to turn organics from their school lunch waste into compost.

STUDENTS SAY YESS AT WOODSIDE HIGH SCHOOL IN REDWOOD CITY

Last spring, Woodside High School's science teacher Ms. Ann Akey led her Green Academy chemistry students in the second year of Youth Exploring Sea Level Rise (YESS).

Students explored the impact of thermal expansion (sea level rise) through the Our Coast Our Future flood mapping tool.



AIRPORT DAY

The Public Works Department promotes interest in aviation through its partnership with the San Carlos Airport and its annual Airport Day, a free community event that draws crowds of children with airport tours, unique aircraft, food trucks, a scavenger hunt, play areas, and airplane and helicopter rides.

PARK SHUTTLE PROGRAM

The County Park Shuttle Program provides free weekend transportation to Edgewood and Wunderlich Parks. The weekend shuttles collect families from stops in East Palo Alto, Menlo Park, North Fair Oaks, and Redwood City.



COLLABORATIVE COMMUNITY **SHARED VISION 2025**

Collaborative communities are those that join government with businesses, schools, non-profits, and community groups to tackle important social issues.



San Mateo County is committed to collaboration, and our officials routinely reach out to community partners to guide policy on child and youth services. One important partner is Leadership Council, which was instrumental in creating the County's Bill of Rights for Children. The Council's mission is to create policies to meet the needs of children, youth, and families

IMMIGRANT INTEGRATION SUMMIT

Immigrants are part of San Mateo County, their children are the future of our region, and they make positive contributions which benefit all residents in the County.

The Office of Immigration Support and Coordination and the Office of Supervisor Warren Slocum partnered with the Silicon Valley Community Foundation to host the Immigrant Integration Summit. The purpose of the Immigrant Integration Summit was to foster dialogue about the current challenges that immigrant youth face in San Mateo County. Participants learned about local, state, and federal policies affecting young immigrants today. They discovered ways to support young immigrants and heard about educational, legal, economic, and social barriers affecting this generation of young immigrants in San Mateo County.

A goal of San Mateo County is to create a master plan to meet the needs of the immigrant population in our communities. The creation of the Office of Immigrant Support and Coordination was the first step to raise awareness and strengthen our community to achieve the goals outlined in the plan.

YOUTH COMMISSION

The San Mateo County Youth Commission is an advisory commission to the San Mateo County Board of Supervisors, established in 1993 to address youth needs in the County and provide youth a voice in local government. The Youth Commission strives to address issues affecting youth in San Mateo County through opening communication between adult and youth perspectives, and giving youth an opportunity to share their ideas, work, and passion. The Youth Commission works to close this communication gap with an annual Youth Conference, which provides youth with an opportunity to lead workshops for youth and adults on important topics.


LITTLE LIBRARIES






Budgeted FY 2017-18 Total Requirements of \$317,463,867 by Funding Source
