However, staff reported that they are posted, and youth reported no complaints concerning any lack of posting. What is in place to ensure that these rules and procedures are understood by minors?: orientation, oral review of rules and procedures **Interviewed Minors:** Yes No Details: We spoke to a number of youth during lunch, though with staff present and sitting at the same table. The youth reported positive things about the camp and their experiences. One inspector observed that the youth did not seem to feel free to talk fully with staff sitting so close by. We spoke with one youth individually with no staff present. He reported liking the camp and feeling that it is a helpful environment for him that has made him feel better about life. His only complaints were the other kids in the camp (some of whom may have gang involvement) who sometimes make threatening comments which staff can't hear. However, there is always a staff member present during the night.

Describe the discipline process of minors: There is a point system. The youth earn points for good behavior and lose points for poor behavior. Points earned can provide significant perks including release time and weekend passes.

Grievance forms are available on the unit and the youth can access them at any time. They then drop them into a bin near the door of the unit.
Number of grievances since last inspection: 22
Trends and/or Comments: A number of the grievances focus on grading issues by one of the teachers,
i.e., low grades without explantion and arbitrary grading. The Institution Services Manager is

concerned about this issue as well with regard to this teacher. He has followed up with her and with

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the school director and is trying to get it resolved. Probation Directors are also aware of the issue and have tried to deal with it. The attempts have so far been unsuccessful.

When youth disagrees with a grievance, it goes to management or staff depending on the subject matter. Management comes to a final decision on each issue.

Comments: The school appears to have good classrooms with adequate supplies. There is now a person assigned to keep track of the students' credits for transfer, IEP's, and class levels. Her name is Megan Price, and she works with the Office of Education. The school director said that her work is extremely useful and helpful and solves issues of credits and transfer.
One of the three teachers is a special education teacher and can work with youth that have IEP's and other specialized needs.
There is a well stocked library and a soon to be revitalized computer lab.

Acceptable Unacceptable: There is no medical staff present in person or on call at night - or in fact during the day when the nurse is not present. The nurse comes twice per week.
Rich Hori is currently negotiating with Susan Kole with regard to health and medical staff, specifically with in getting an on-all nurse available for the YSC. This nurse would also cover on-call assistance for Camp Glenwood. Rich Hori believes that an agreement putting in place an on-call nurse will go forward.

Overall Impressions, Comments, and/or Concerns

General comments or concerns that should be noted that haven't already been addressed?:

Currently, there is construction taking place at the camp. The administration building is closed for this reason. Completion of construction is estimated as October or November. Once the construction is completed, management intends to work on increasing population of youth at the camp.

Overall, the camp appears to be a very positive environment for the youth, who are kept busy doing various productive tasks, fed fresh healthful food, and taught consistently at school. They are able to have recreation, learning, work, and rest. The garden is very impressive as is the quality of the food.

We learned that the Camp management and probation are planning to implement a new policy requiring youth who are ordered into the Camp Program to have a home phone at the residence of their parent(s) or guardian(s). We believe this will be done in the form of a blanket court order. We think that this could potentially disadvantage youth who are more financially needy and that there could be better alternatives, such as GPS tracking on cell phones. We recommend Commission discussion and follow up on this issue.
