Give a general description of the property: This is a 4 bedroom, three bath home with a comfortable common area upstairs that includes the kitchen and dining areas. Downstairs is the staff office, another common room, and one 2 bedroom and bath. The adjacent garage has the weight machine and laundry facilities.

The property is small in area with no lawn, on a residential street with single family homes much like the facility.

Give a general description of the main facility including housekeeping and sanitation:

Although the facility may have been "scrubbed down" for our visit, we found it to be very clean and in general good condition. The bathrooms and kitchen were immaculate and no offensive odors were detected. The youth are responsible for most cleaning chores but staff steps in as necessary.

Upon arrival, he is greeted, meets the other staff and residents and is oriented to the house rules and expectations.

One of the youth spoke limited English so he was interviewed by Commissioner Gonzalez who interpreted questions from Commissioner Bresee. Weaker minors protected from having food taken from them?: Yes No Details: Program manager stated that not only were such youth protected, there is such ample food available with access to the refrigerator, food cupboards and freezer, there is no problem. Mealtimes (no more than 4 hours between meals, breakfast to dinner, without a snack) **Breakfast:** As early as 5:30 a.m. **Lunch:** Noon, but most of the youth eat at school. They can make and take their lunches, but most are provided with lunch money. **Dinner:** 6:00 p.m. or adjusted around individual schedules. Comments: Three of the youths praised the food and the availability of snacks. The Spanish speaking youth expressed a desire for more meals consistent with his cultural preferences. The program director stated that they make every effort to provide culturally oriented offerings and when the youth are taken out to restaurants or for take-out, preferences are honored as much as possible.

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Discipline of Minors

Describe the discipline process of minors: Staff discuss issues with the youth. There is a system of points and levels that determine privileges. The youth are entitled to a minimum allowance and can earn additional funds by performance and taking on additional chores. Visitation and off-site privileges are awarded or limited based on performance. Access to cell phones and/or x-boxes is often limited as a consequence.

Grievance Process: Acceptable Unacceptable:
Depends on the grievance; e.g. between youth or involving staff. The Program Director deals with each grievance and if not resolved it will go to Ms. Carpenter for final resolution.
Number of grievances this year: Minor to serious. 6 to 8 @ month.
Trends and/or Comments: The vast majority have involved youth to youth disagreements. Fighting is not tolerated and police are called if there is violence, which is not tolerated.

General comments or concerns that should be noted that have not already been address?: The condition of the house was excellent and much improved from last year. The concerns about recreation and exercise remain. The conversations with the youth were candid and helpful. One youth said he "loves it here." Another said it is the best placement he has ever had and explained that at the MAC home, there was mutual respect between the kids and the staff and he enjoyed the flexibility and trust he was given. It should be noted that Idries Pearson is the Interim Program Director at the home, and it is clear that the changes he has made in the brief time he has been there have been significant. It is hoped that his successor will be equally effective.
