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Presentation by Peggy Jenson, Deputy County Manager	<ul> <li>San Mateo County's Recovery Initiative is a collaboration among local government agencies, non-governmental organizations, private partners, and residents to promote an inclusive recovery and leverage the collective capacity of the whole community to build a more equitable, healthy, and connected San Mateo County.</li> <li>Recovery Initiative organization: Recovery Coordination Council, public information and outreach group, equity recovery group, public health committee, economic recovery committee, vulnerable populations support committee, community infrastructure committee and education and childcare committee.</li> <li>Equity is the foundational principal of this entire initiative. The Equity Recovery Council identified five questions that we expect every committee to ask every recommendation coming forward</li> <li>What we have learned:         <ul> <li>Many questions about the COVID-19 health and safety guidelines.</li> <li>Lower income residents are most affected by the pandemic.</li> <li>Lack of technology tools, digital expertise and wi-fi access are increasing economic and racial disparities.</li> <li>Almost all small businesses, including child care, are struggling.</li> <li>Consumers and parents remain concerned about safety.</li> <li>Shelter in place is challenging for young children, students, and families</li> <li>Our committees have put together a series of over 100 recommendations that are being shared with a variety of stakeholders. All comments will be incorporated into a final draft, which will be presented to our recovery reporting council on September 18.</li> </ul> </li> </ul>

## 7. Presentation on Immigrant Relief Fund

• Earlier in Spring, the Board of Supervisors expressed interest in
providing support to undocumented residents of the County who were
unable to qualify for federal unemployment benefits and for the stimulus
benefits.
The Legal Aid Society at San Mateo County was developing a new fund
for exactly that purpose. The Supervisors opted to support this fund
called San Mateo County Immigrant Relief Fund.
• It has been seeded with philanthropic contributions by John Sobrato and
other local foundations.
Funds are distributed to recipients by Mission Asset Fund.
• As of today, \$9.4 million have been distributed.
• Assistance is based on need, targeted at \$1,000 per family unit
There is a multi-step process to apply. Residents who need help first
submit pre-application through the Mission Asset Fund website to
determine their eligibility. Eligible applications are invited to submit a
full application.
• Encourage community members to apply. Visit Mission Asset Fund:
https://missionassetfund.org/immigrant-families-grant-sm/
• To date, there are 28,741 pre-applications, 14,157 invitations to re-
applicants to submit their full applications.
• 9,589 grant applications have started and a total of 8,550 grants have
been approved.
