It holds regular monthly meetings to address the needs of the community, act as a forum, and serve as an advisory body to the Board of Supervisors.

3. Recommendation on 823 6th Avenue, Redwood City, Off-Street Parking Exception to allow for the maintenance of an existing one covered parking space, where two covered parking spaces are the minimum required associated with a proposed addition to the rear of an existing single-family residence which was built in 1948 with only a one car garage. No changes are proposed to the front of the house. An Off-Street Parking Exception is required since there is insufficient room on the sides of the house to construct an additional covered parking space

Presentation by Dennis Aguirre, Planner, County of San Mateo	• An off-street parking exception is requested as the owner wishes to construct a 583 square feet bedroom in the back of their house to accommodate their growing family. The existing property is currently 1,477 square feet. The proposed addition would bring the total floor area ratio to 2,060 sq. ft., which is still below he maximum floor area ratio for that region which is 2,717 sq. ft.

4. Update: Department of Public Works, Middlefield Rd Project

 Property owners will have the option of voting for either a 2 ft. wide or 3 ft. wide gutter and a 22 ft. wide roadway and 3 ft. wide valley gutters. If anybody would like to get an idea of what Loyola Ave. will look like after construction, Amherst Ave. would be a good example. The last update that was provided to the Council on the Middlefield Road project was on November 2019. At that time, it was projected that the project will begin Summer 2021 as this is contingent on permit and agreement approvals from the railroad agencies: CPUC (California Public Utilities Commission), SamTrans, Union Pacific Railroad, and PG& E. COVID-19 is also a factor that is being considered as many local businesses have been affected. Dept. of Public Works will work closely with Supervisor Slocum's office to determine whether it is appropriate to move forward with the project at this time. The anticipated construction duration is 1.5 years (through Fall/Winter 2022).

	incidents. Large crowds made it difficult for the Sheriff's Office to
	enter the area in the dark as streets were blocked to allow for illegal
	fireworks to be ignited.
	 Deputies wrote 20 citations and confiscated a considerable number
	of illegal fireworks.
	• Prevention planning has begun for New Year's Eve 2021 and July 4,
	2021. It was determined that additional technology is needed to
	assist with the apprehension of these offenders. The focus will be to
	get the fireworks off the street and issue search warrants of homes
	that are suspected of selling these illegal fireworks.
	 Deputy County Manager Justin Mates added that he would be happy

		• The County's census response is good thus far, as 2010's numbers have been met at a 73.4% response rate. There is still time to get additional responses, particularly in the North Fair Oaks area as it has a low response rate.
		• The Great Plates Program, which provides free meals to seniors, has been extended through August 9 th .
		• The County has a total of 4,400 COVID-19 cases. There is a disproportionately high infection rate among Latinos. Micro-targeted outreach efforts have been done for the Spanish-speaking Latino community in North Fair Oaks. These efforts will be expanded to other parts of the County.
