

*since realignment began in October 2011, there have been one thousand three hundred and sixty-five (1365) supervisees.



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
PRCS and MS Released to SMC Supervision





There were twenty-five (25) terminations during the reporting period. Fifty-two percent (52%) were successful.

In the reporting period, we filed a total of forty-six (46) revocations. PRCS and MS each had a total of twenty-three (23) revocations each. The breakdown by violation category is below:

Generally, the population is reoffending by committing crimes similar to those for which they are on Realignment, namely non-serious, non-violent, non-serious sex related crimes.

Thirty-three percent (33%) were for technical violations, a decrease when compared to the previous quarter (47%). Technical violations of supervision are filed when supervisees abscond or fail to abstain from substance use. Forty-eight percent (48%) of the revocations filed were for new law violations involving crimes against persons, property and drug/alcohol related crimes.

There were twenty-seven (27) flashes during this reporting period.

There was one (1) PRCS supervisee whose charges were reduced and subsequently terminated because of Prop 47. Four (4) cases were transferred to different counties.

Post-Release Community Supervision: 20 cases

There were a total of 20 new local PRCS bookings in October; 8 were booked on a Flash Incarceration (PC3454) and were in custody during the month a total of 57 days or 7 days on average.

12 inmates were booked on a local PRCS revocation (PC3455).

Parole Revocation: 7 cases

There were 7 parole revocation hearings in October. 7 inmates were given revocation sentences and are expected to serve a total of 339 revocation days in custody, or an average of 48 days each.

Post-Release Community Supervision: 12 cases

There were a total of 12 new local PRCS bookings in November; 7 were booked on a Flash Incarceration (PC3454) and were in custody during the month a total of 72 days or 10 days on average. 5 inmates were booked on a local PRCS revocation (PC3455).

Parole Revocation: 4 cases

There were 4 parole revocation hearings in November. 4 inmates were given revocation sentences and are expected to serve a total of 251 revocation days in custody, or an average of 63 days each.

There were a total of 17 new local PRCS bookings in December; 11 were booked on a Flash Incarceration (PC3454) and were in custody during the month a total of 84 days or 8 days on average. 6 inmates were booked on a local PRCS revocation (PC3455).

Parole Revocation: 6 cases

There were 6 parole revocation hearings in December. 6 inmates were given revocation sentences and are expected to serve a total of 239 revocation days in custody, or an average of 40 days each.



Executive Summary:

Offenses committed by the supervised and in-custody realignment populations in San Mateo County during October—December 2015 (Q4) indicate that this population commits drug offenses and property crime. There is no significant involvement in serious or violent crimes.

Overview:

Analysis of the offenses committed by active realignment offenders (both supervised and in-custody) in Q4 revealed that the top 4 committing offenses were drug offenses, identity theft, vehicle theft, and burglary. This report will examine how the top offenses committed by the realignment population correlates to overall crime trends in San Mateo County. Specifically, this report examines vehicle theft and burglary activity committed in San Mateo County since the inception of Public Safety Realignment/AB109 (2010-2015). The data used for this analysis was derived from UCR (Uniform Crime Reports).



Note: Although the reader may be inclined to correlate the top realignment offenses with actual crime trends, please be advised that the realignment population is a small population compared to the overall offender population in and out of custody.


Breakdown of Burglary

2010-2015


Analysis of reported burglaries that occurred in San Mateo County between 2010 and 2015 revealed that burglaries increased by 6% in 2015 compared to 2010.

The first figure below represents reported burglary in San Mateo County overall between 2010 and 2015. The second figure shows the breakdown of burglary activity among all the law enforcement agencies in the county for 2014 and 2015. Burglary in San Mateo County increased 5% between 2014-2015. *Please note that the enactment of Prop 47 in November 2014 changed how some burglaries are defined and classified. Some crimes that used to be considered burglary are no longer, and are instead classified as larceny. Despite this reclassification, burglary activity has still increased in San Mateo County.*

*The Sheriff's Office reported 54 incidents of 459.5 PC in 2015; they would have had 492 burglaries in 2015 if Prop 47 had not reclassified some commercial burglaries to larceny.


Breakdown of Vehicle Theft

2010-2015


Analysis of reported vehicle thefts that occurred in San Mateo County between 2010 and 2015 revealed that vehicle thefts decreased 8% countywide.

The first figure below represents reported vehicle thefts in San Mateo County overall between 2010 and 2015. The second figure shows the breakdown of vehicle theft activity among all the law enforcement agencies in the county for 2014 and 2015. Vehicle thefts in San Mateo County increased 2% between 2014-2015.

Vehicle Theft in San Mateo County






AB109: San Mateo County

As of December 31, 2015, the entire realignment population in San Mateo County—both in and out of custody—consisted of approximately 529 offenders. The supervised realignment population in San Mateo County was made up of 239 subjects on PRCS and 192 subjects on Mandatory Supervision (San Mateo County Probation Department). The in-custody (1170(h)) population consisted of 98 offenders.

From October-December 2015 the PRCS population increased by 13% and the MS population increased by 14% since Q3 2015. Overall, there was an 18% increase in the PRCS population since the beginning of 2015, and a 31% in the Mandatory Supervision population.




Note: It is likely that there are a small number of offenders that may have been double counted depending on their in-custody or out-of-custody status at the time these numbers were generated. This data was obtained from different sources (probation, jail) and therefore may overlap slightly. However the preceding analysis provides a general picture of the San Mateo County realignment population.


San Mateo County: *In Custody*

Maguire Correctional Facility:

AB109 In-Custody: Public Safety Realignment has been in place for just over four years. A comparison of the AB109 In-Custody population at the end of Quarter 4 each year reflects a peak in the population at the end of year 2 (2013). The subsequent drop at the end of 2014 and 2015 could be attributed to the implementation of Prop 47 in November 2014. As a result of this change in the law, some offenders received a reduction in their sentence and were released early from custody/supervision.



1170(h) Population: Analysis of the offenses committed by the 1170(h) population in custody on December 31, 2015, **servicing their original sentences**, revealed that the top four committing offenses included drug offenses, vehicle theft, identity theft, and burglary. These offenses are consistent with the top four offenses committed by the entire realignment population overall.



Conclusion:

Analysis of 2015 criminal incident data shows a slight decrease in vehicle theft activity and an increase in burglary activity since the implementation of Public Safety Realignment in 2010. Members of the realignment population were most commonly sentenced for committing offenses of drugs, vehicle theft, ID theft, and burglary, which is consistent with the intent of AB109 to address non-violent and non-serious offenders. ***However, it is important to keep in mind that the realignment population is a small population compared to the overall offender population in San Mateo County.***



Due to the change in burglary classification as a result of Prop 47, it is difficult to see how specific burglary categories are being affected. Although this report shows a slight increase in overall burglary countywide, crime trends indicate *residential* burglary has increased dramatically. The Sheriff's Office alone saw a 52% increase in residential burglaries between October—December 2015 (Q4). Further analysis is necessary to determine whether other jurisdictions have experienced the same.

Although this report shows an overall decrease in countywide vehicle theft, it is likely that some cities in the county have experienced an increase in such activity. The Sheriff's Office, for example, saw a 57% increase in vehicle theft in Q4 2015 compared to Q4 2014.


The NCRIC will continue to analyze 2015 crime data to identify specific crime trends, the effects of Prop 47, and the relationship this may have to the realignment population in San Mateo County.

- What is the recidivism rate of **terminated** realignment offenders in San Mateo County?
- How is Proposition 47 affecting the realignment population in San Mateo County?
- Where are realignment offenders committing new crimes?

FY 15-16, Q2 (October 2015 – December 2015)

New Intakes

There was an increase of 66% in new intakes in the 2nd quarter when compared to the 1st quarter of FY 15-16. Aside from having more new intakes in all program types, there were 6 Parolees taken in in the 2nd quarter. This was the first time Parolees participated in the program. In comparison to the new intakes in 2nd quarter of FY 14-15, FY 15-16 2nd quarter was higher by 9%. With the increase in intakes, Social Workers' caseload increased by 60%, from 146 total in the 1st quarter to 234 total by the end of Dec. 2015. Social Workers were managing an average of 78 cases each by the end of the 2nd quarter.

Eligibility/Benefits

Total applications for State benefits of 118 in the 2nd quarter of FY 15-16 was higher by 33% than the applications received in the 1st quarter. When compared to the FY 14-15 2nd quarter's 153 applications, 2nd quarter FY 15-16 is 23% lower. For the 1st semester of FY 15-16, applications received were 98 for CalFresh, 67 for General Assistance, and 42 for Medical.

Employment Services – 550 Jobs!

In the 2nd quarter of FY 15-16, 14 clients were employed out of 18 participants which is a 78% employment rate. Overall, job placements for the 1st semester of FY 15-16 reached 81%. 16 of the total 30 hired during the semester were placed under community employment accounting for half (53%) of total placements during the period. Average wage earned under community employment was \$12.36/hour. 78% job placements in 2nd quarter of FY15-16 is a significant improvement from the 61% placements in same quarter of FY 14-15. Community employment in the 2nd quarter were in the fields of food service, retail, entertainment, and other services including transportation and delivery service.

Services Provided to Clients

The most requested support by clients was shelter. 291 motel vouchers issued in the 1st quarter increased to 481 in the 2nd quarter or an increase of 65%, and shelter bed nights increased from 262 to 348 or an increase of 33%. This resulted to an overall increase of 49.9% in shelter services. Food assistance also increased in issuance by 49%. Single bus ride tickets was the third most requested service/support with a 30% increase between the 2 quarters.

Family Re-Engagement

There were 2 family re-engagement events held during the 2nd quarter of FY 15-16. A graduation ceremony was held for 10 Service Connect clients who completed Probation. Members of the graduates' family were invited to celebrate with them. A Christmas party was held for clients and their families at the Service Connect office in San Carlos, California. No community outreach events were set-up during the 2nd quarter. Currently, a calendar is being developed to plan community re-engagement events for the balance of the year.

Peer Support/Groups

A total of 24 new referrals were assigned to the current Peer Mentors in the 2nd quarter of FY 15-16. As of Dec. 2015, there are a total of 77 clients connected to a Peer Mentor. For Support Groups, the Iron Sharpens Iron group had 11 meetings held during the 2nd quarter for a total of 33 meetings for the 1st semester. The Moral Reconciliation Therapy started with 4 participants in Oct. and ended with 2 participants in December. There were no new graduates for the program.




At-A-Glance: All Time Total BHRS Referred/Served/Number of Services/Incarcerated




Open Cases w/ a Service




Progress and Impact on Recidivism



Clients by Treatment Plan Type







Note: This version of the Q2 Dashboard was submitted to meet agenda deadlines and the data continues to update over time. Any notable changes between February 1st and the February 18th meeting date will be verbally reported on February 18th and corrected in the Q3 report. This will be an ongoing approach with this report.

AT-A-GLANCE: All Time Total BHRS Referred, Served, Number of Services, or Booking Encounter

The total number of participants referred to BHRS for treatment since the inception of the Service Connect is 1,326 and of these, 689 entered into treatment and/or recovery plans (these participants were served by BHRS and is a lower number because not all assessments result in treatment). Referred is defined as participants showing up for the first post-referral appointment and does not include those referred, but who did not follow through on the referral. This graphic also represents the total number of services (both mental health and substance use treatment) provided to participants between FY12/13 and the second quarter of FY 15/16. Service type detail is presented in the pie chart at the bottom of the dashboard. The number of services has generally grown as compared to previous years. The "Jail Encounters" data is blank since a match request was submitted and acknowledged, but not yet completed. These data are not final for 2/1/16.

Service Connect Cases with a Service

This graph represents total Service Connect participants that received at least one BHRS service. The numbers do include participants that continued from year to year, so a participant could be counted more than once in each year if their case was open across multiple fiscal years. Therefore, this graph indicates the total open cases from the previous year for reference, the total open cases for the current year, and the newly open cases for the first and second quarter of this fiscal year. Significant to historical growth is trending for FY 15/16 because the number of new participants in the first and second quarter exceeds the annual growth rate of new participants for all previous fiscal years. The current data for Q2 may be understated and changes in data between now and the CCP Meeting will be verbally reported at the CCP meeting and corrected with next quarterly report, so these data are not final for 2/1/16.

Overall Progress and Impact on Recidivism

For those participants that have a treatment or recovery plan and exited the program in the second quarter, more than half have unsatisfactory progress towards completing their plan goals upon completion of the program, which is a shift as compared to the first quarter (reasons include discontinued treatment, moved out of area, re-incarcerated, or deceased). Data for those participants that became re-incarcerated during the first or second quarter is currently unavailable. A data match with the jail was initiated, but has not yet been completed. These data are final for 2/1/16.

Percent of Participants with Substance Abuse Recovery Plan or a Mental Health Treatment Plan

This graph presents what percentage of Service Connect participants had a mental health treatment plan or a substance abuse recovery plan. Recovery plans are established at a rate of two to one as compared to a mental health treatment plan. Trends in the second quarter are consistent with the first quarter (Co-Occurring participants are not represented). Plans for cases initiated in the quarter can take up to 60 days to submit, so these data are not final for 2/1/16.

Engaged Participants with Four or More Services in a Year

"Engaged" is defined as a participant that has received four or more services. This means that the participant has returned to BHRS for multiple appointments regarding different services, which demonstrates that the participant is engaged in treatment because they actively participate. The second quarter is under reported at this time and is expected to trend consistent with the first quarter so these data are not final for 2/1/16.

Mental Health and Alcohol & Other Drugs Services Provided by Service Connect

This pie chart reports mental health and substance abuse treatment services provided by BHRS to Service Connect participants for the second quarter. Data are not final for 2/1/16.

Mobile Health Van Services

This graph reports data for the first two quarters for the Mobile Health. Notable change between quarters is a decrease in work related physicals coupled with an increase in medically fragile cases and medication refills. Data is final for 2/1/16.

Correctional Health Services

Correctional Health data presents the total participants that flow through Correctional Health in each quarter, the number of participants screened, the number treated medically, for mental illness, and for substance abuse. Correctional Health has experienced significant growth over the first quarter and the data is final for 2/1/16.

Service Connect Cases with PES Counts

A Psychiatric Emergency Services (PES) count is when a Service Connect participant has presented themselves at PES. Those participants that were not admitted are shown as a "visit" and those admitted are shown as "inpatient." Involvement with PES is only counted if enrolled in Service Connect, counts do not include episodes when subject was not a participant in Service Connect (prior reports did count such episodes). Visits have generally remained steady and inpatient has decreased, but may increase slightly as these data is not final for 2/1/16.
