




## Active Supervisees by Gender



## Active Supervisees by Age







### Supervisees by Gender







## Terminations, Revocations and Flashes

There were forty-seven (47) terminations during the reporting period. Over half of them were successful.

In the reporting period, we filed a total of fifty-nine (59) revocations. Of those, twenty-nine (29) were PRCS revocations and thirty (30) were MS revocations. The breakdown by violation category is below:

Generally, the population is reoffending by committing crimes similar to those for which they are on Realignment, namely non-serious, non-violent, non-serious sex related crimes. More than half of revocations filed, a combined 51%, were for new law violations involving property and drug/alcohol related crimes. The percentage of revocations filed (34%) for technical violations declined when compared to the previous quarter. Technical violations of supervision are filed when supervisees absconde or fail to abstain from substance use. A very small percentage involves other crimes such as robbery, battery, criminal threats and/or evading a peace officer.

There were twenty-five (25) flashes during this reporting period.

40 inmates (30 men, 10 women) were sentenced to the County jail under PC 1170(h) during January. After credits, these inmates are expected to serve a total of 6,901 days, or on average 173 days each. 11 of these inmates have split sentences, (6 men and 5 women). 10 inmates were sentenced on mandatory supervision cases.

For comparison, 234 persons (including self-surrenders) were sentenced to terms in the San Mateo County jail exclusive of the PC 1170(h) cases. After credits, these inmates are expected to serve a total of 9,851 days, or on average 42 days each.

### Post-Release Community Supervision: 28 cases

There were 28 local PRCS bookings in January. PRCS inmates were in custody 806 days this month. Cumulatively there have been 95 PRCS bookings since October 2013 totaling 3,613 days in custody. The average time in custody is 38 days.

### Parole Revocation: 7 cases

There were 7 parole revocation hearings in January. 7 inmates were given revocation sentences and are expected to serve a total of 311 revocation days in custody, or on average 44 days each. The cumulative total of revocation hearings since October 2013 is 21 cases which are expected to serve a total of 825 days.

As of July 1, 2013, responsibility for the adjudication of parole violations moved from the Board of Parole to the courts. As a result, Parole will defer to the DA if the defendant has an on-view case and a 3056 hold by dropping their hold. Since this change became effective there has been a decrease in the Parole revocation sentences and hearings.





16 inmates (14 men, 2 women) were sentenced to the County jail under PC 1170(h) during February. After credits, these inmates are expected to serve a total of 2,051 days, or on average 128 days each. 7 of these inmates have split sentences and all 7 are men.

**Note:** 5 of the 16 inmates were sentenced on mandatory supervision revocation cases.

For comparison, 198 persons (including self-surrenders) were sentenced to terms in the San Mateo County jail exclusive of the PC 1170(h) cases. After credits, these inmates are expected to serve a total of 8,072 days, or on average 41 days each.

### Post-Release Community Supervision: 26 cases

There were 26 local PRCS bookings in February. PRCS inmates were in custody 910 days this month. Cumulatively there have been 121 PRCS bookings since October 2013 totaling 4,523 days in custody. The average time in custody is 37 days.

### Parole Revocation: 2 cases

There were 2 parole revocation hearings in February. 2 inmates were given revocation sentences and are expected to serve a total of 61 revocation days in custody, or on average 31 days each. The cumulative total of revocation hearings since October 2013 is 23 cases which are expected to serve a total of 886 days.

As of July 1, 2013, responsibility for the adjudication of parole violations moved from the Board of Parole to the courts. As a result, Parole will defer to the DA if the defendant has an on-view case and a 3056 hold by dropping their hold. \*\*Since this change became effective there has been a decrease in the Parole revocation sentences and hearings.





20 inmates (19 men, 1 woman) were sentenced to the County jail under PC 1170(h) during March. After credits, these inmates are expected to serve a total of 4,321 days, or an average of 216 days each. 5 (25%) of these inmates have split sentences and all are men.

**Mandatory Supervision Revocations:** In March, 3 mandatory supervisees were revoked (1 revoked/reinstated, 2 revoked/terminated). They are expected to serve a total of 629 days, or an average of 210 days each. (These numbers are not reflected in the above 1170(h) table.)

For comparison, 164 people (including self-surrenders) were sentenced to terms in the Sheriff's Office Correctional Facilities exclusive of the PC 1170(h) cases in March. These inmates are expected to serve a total of 7,064 days, or an average of 43 days each.

### Post-Release Community Supervision: 26 cases

There were 26 local PRCS bookings in March. All PRCS inmates in custody at the end of March accounted for 992 custody days. Cumulatively, there have been 147 PRCS bookings since October 2013 (Year 3) totaling 5,515 days in custody. The average time in custody is 38 days.

### Parole Revocation: 8 cases

There were 8 parole revocation hearings in March. 8 inmates were given revocation sentences and are expected to serve a total of 398 revocation days in custody, or an average of 50 days each. Since October 2013, a total of 31 parolees have been sentenced on a revocation; the total number of days in custody is 1,284 days or an average of 41 days each.

As of July 1, 2013, responsibility for the adjudication of parole violations moved from the Board of Parole to the Courts. Since this change became effective there has been a decrease in the number of Parole revocation hearings and sentences.





**SUBJECT:** AB 109-Quarterly Report to the Community Corrections Partnership (1/1/14 – 3/31/14)

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This quarter, the HSA Service Connect data report has been pared down significantly to more efficiently convey key trends. In future reports, we look forward to utilizing more graphical representations of the below data.

Exciting news from the CWDA Budget Update #4, released June 16, 2014: Repealing Lifetime Ban on Drug Felons in CalWORKs and CalFresh – Both Budget Committees approved \$9 million to repeal the lifetime ban on drug felons in the CalWORKs and CalFresh programs. This item remains in the budget adopted by the Legislature.

- **Number of Supervisees reporting to Service Connect - Post Release Community Supervision (PRCS) and Mandatory Supervision (MS)**

Q3 – (1/1/14 – 3/31/14): 62 total supervisees (20 classified as PRCS; 34 classified as MS; 8 with unknown classification)

On January 1, 2014 all individuals eligible to continue to receive ACE/MCE converted into a parallel program under the Affordable Care Act (ACA). The Access to Care for Everyone (ACE) Program provides a set of health benefits for uninsured adult residents of San Mateo County, age 19 and older, who have low incomes and who are ineligible for health coverage through Medi-Cal or Covered CA. No new referrals were made to ACE in the third quarter, as all clients were found eligible or remain in a pending status for Medi-Cal coverage under the new HCR/ACA.

During Q3, a total of twenty one (21) clients of the thirty-eight (38) referred in the quarter (55%) were placed in jobs. Out of the twenty one (21) placed, ten (10) were in community employment and eleven (11) were placed in the offsite training programs, Re-Entry Employment Preparation Program (REEP) and South Bay Recycle (SBR). The industry areas include: warehouse, food services, driver, construction/trades, and office work. The pay range was \$9.00-\$30.00. Supervisees were hired as: Demonstrator, Server, Park Aide, Waste Water Operator, Mechanical Engineer, Warehouse Operations Assistant, Tow Truck Driver, Recycle Sorter, Home Appliance Repair, Sous Chef and Real Estate Assistant. Of the twenty one (21) clients placed, eighteen (18) earned \$11.00 or more per hour.

*Support Groups and Moral Reconciliation Therapy*

Supervisees are encouraged to participate in weekly support and/or Moral Reconciliation Therapy (MRT) groups, which are hosted by Service Connect staff. During the report period 18 (eighteen) support groups and 19 (nineteen) MRT groups were held. Additionally, a new MRT group in Redwood City was started on January 8, 2014.

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‡ 550 Jobs! is a short-term, subsidized employment program that provides participants with part-time (30-hours per week) employment at \$8.00/hr., starting as early as the Monday following their release.

*Ongoing Supportive Services*

Individuals who are actively engaged in services can receive on-going supportive services, including but not limited to, bus tickets/passes, food totes, auxiliary payments, educational support, and/or other applicable forms of assistance.



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## Public Hearings Set on 'Recidivism' Definition

SACRAMENTO – A Board of State and Community Corrections committee made up of public safety officials and subject matter experts has released a draft of its definition of “recidivism,” a key term that will be useful in measuring progress on Realignment goals.

The proposed definition is as follows: “Recidivism is defined as a conviction of a new crime committed within three years of release from custody or committed within three years of placement on supervision for a previous criminal conviction.”

The BSCC will accept public comment and input on the definition in writing from June 3 until July 3. In addition, the BSCC will hold public hearings in Fresno on June 18, in Los Angeles on June 19 and in San Francisco on June 25.

The committee will consider public comment before making recommendations to the BSCC. The committee continues to work on other standard definitions related to Realignment.

In an effort to make consistent the data collected across 58 counties, in 2013 Governor Jerry Brown signed AB 1050, which requires the BSCC to develop definitions so that the state can provide a standard that counties can use to measure the effectiveness of their evidence-based rehabilitative practices.

AB 1050 amended Section 6027 of the Penal Code to require the board to: “Develop definitions of key terms, including, but not limited to, ‘recidivism,’ ‘average daily population,’ ‘treatment program completion rates,’ and any other terms deemed relevant in order to facilitate consistency in local data collection, evaluation, and implementation of evidence-based practices, promising evidence-based practices, and evidence-based programs.”

The committee has been meeting since Jan. 30 to develop the first definition. It is hoped that counties and law enforcement agencies will use the standard definitions for these key terms once all are developed and approved by the BSCC.

Since 2011 California has been investing hundreds of millions of dollars at the local level so that low-level, non-violent offenders and parole violators would serve their terms in county jails, closer to support systems and the rehabilitative programming that officials of the 58 counties determine work best for their communities. A central goal of Realignment is reducing recidivism.

The BSCC is mandated by AB 109 to collect and maintain data about state and community correction policies, practices and needs. Having standard definitions will promote consistent statewide reporting.

Regional Public Comment Sessions

Assembly Bill (AB) 1050 (Chapter 270, Statutes of 2013) tasked the BSCC with defining several key terms in an effort to facilitate consistency in data reporting. Specifically AB 1050 states:

*Develop definitions of key terms, including, but not limited to, "recidivism," "average daily population," "treatment program completion rates," and any other terms deemed relevant in order to facilitate consistency in local data collection, evaluation, and implementation of evidence-based practices, promising evidence-based practices, and evidence-based programs.*

In conjunction with subject matter experts the BSCC has developed the following draft definition of recidivism.

**Adult Recidivism Definition**

Recidivism is defined as a conviction of a new crime committed within three years of release from custody or committed within three years of placement on supervision for a previous criminal conviction.

**Measurement**

The above base definition was developed to promote consistent statewide reporting. However other useful elements can be measured to better understand recidivism trends. These include, but are not limited to arrests, returns to custody, and technical violations of conditions of supervision.

The BSCC is hosting public comment sessions on the above draft recidivism definition to allow interested parties and the general public an opportunity to offer thoughts and/or suggested changes.
