



SEWER/SANITATION DISTRICTS IN COUNTY GOVERNMENT


EACH DISTRICT IS AN INDEPENDENT ENTITY WITH ITS OWN SEPARATE BUDGET

- Each District's Governing Board is the Board of Supervisors
- The District receives Sewer Service Charges and limited property taxes within the District boundaries to fund sewer service
- The Sewer Service Charges are a Fee For Service, Not a Tax
- The District collects Sewer Service Charges on the Tax Bill because it is least costly way to collect the fee



WHERE DOES MY PROPERTY TAX MONEY

Note: CSCSD allocation of a portion (0.99%) of the property tax is approximately \$71,900 per year.



- The permanent repair of the Seneca Lane sewer main damaged by mudslide (2017 winter storms) was completed in 2020. Coordinated with FEMA/CalOES for partial reimbursement.
- Contributed to the purchase of shared maintenance equipment (Vac-Con flusher-vacuum truck)
- Sanitary Sewer Overflow (SSO) Response, Reporting, Water Quality Monitoring, and Public Awareness Program
- Provide 24/7 emergency response to clear blockages in private laterals and services during COVID-19 pandemic
- Paid \$119,231 annual loan payment to the State Revolving Fund for the completed 1999 Master Plan Capital Improvement Projects (\$1.95M loan)



- Paid \$489,092 annual loan payment to County General Fund for District's share of the Crystal Springs/El Cerrito Sewer Trunk Line projects completed by the Town of Hillsborough and City of San Mateo (\$7.3M loan)
 - 1) <u>Town of Hillsborough Project Elements</u>:
 - Upsized 9,600 feet of 8-in. to 15-in. diameter pipes with 18-in. diameter pipes on Crystal Springs Road and El Cerrito Avenue
 - Project completed in Feb. 2017
 - Final project cost \$10,007,515
 - ***** District share of project costs (paid with County loan proceeds):
 - \$3,702,780 37% of eligible costs (based on wet weather flow)
 - 2) City of San Mateo Project Elements:
 - Constructed 10,000 feet of 27-in. and 30-in. diameter pipes as relief line for wet weather flows
 - Project completed in May 2017
 - Final project cost \$11,587,347
 - ***** District share of project (paid with County loan proceeds):
 - \$3,573,657 37% of eligible costs (based on wet weather flow)

Primary Causes of SSOs: Roots, Paper Towels, and Heavy-duty Wipes.

3 (2017), 8 (2018) and 2 (2019) SSO occurrences due to Seneca Lane mudslide site.

Preventative maintenance on District sewer mains is being performed at 9 month frequencies.



The toilet is only meant to flush the three P'spee, poop and paper.

WHAT'S TAKEN PLACE SINCE LAST RATE ADJUSTMENT

REGULATORY COMPLIANCE CONTINUES:

- State Water Resources Control Board
 - Development and continuous updating of Sewer System Management Plan (SSMP)
 - Reporting to State Office of Emergency Services certain types of SSO's within 2 hours
 - Sampling of water within 48 hours when SSO enters a creek or stream
 - Training maintenance staff on SSO response
 - 2009 Cease and Desist Order (CDO) Annual Reports due May 15th:
 - a) Sewer System Cleaning and Root Control Program
 - b) Infrastructure Renewal
 - c) Progress of Short and Long Term Improvements
 - d) Reporting required until City of San Mateo CDO is dismissed


ELEMENTS OF THE SEWER SERVICE RATES – CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS (CIP)

HIGH PRIORITY CIPs IDENTIFIED THROUGH CONDITION ASSESSMENTS

- Improvements are recommended based on the following:
 - * Lack of capacity in pipe
 - **& Excessive maintenance costs**
 - Structural defects in pipe
- Portions of your Sewer Service Charges collected are used to pay for system improvements.

PAYING FOR SEWAGE TRANSPORT, TREATMENT, AND DISPOSAL

- Sewage Transport, Treatment, and Disposal
- > Downstream Agency Capital Improvement Projects
 - City of San Mateo Clean Water Program (CWP)
 - Current estimate of CSCSD's share of costs is estimated to be approximately \$1.7 million each year for 30 years with various City financing exclusively for the CWP expenses



ELEMENTS OF THE SEWER SERVICE RATES – OUT OF DISTRICT COSTS

- City of San Mateo receives, conveys and treats wastewater from CSCSD and other regional customers in service area boundary.
- CSCSD's wastewater is conveyed through the Town of Hillsborough and City of San Mateo collection systems and Dale Ave Pump Station to the WWTP
- San Mateo, Foster City, Hillsborough, San Mateo County, and CSCSD each have a financial responsibility for the capital improvements.


The proposed rate includes a 6.7% increase, equating to an \$100/equivalent residential unit or \$8.33/month/equivalent residential unit increase.

The proposed increase, by itself, is not adequate to pay the CSCSD's portion of the City's CWP, however, it improves the CSCSD's financial position to meet these requirements.

RATE SETTING TIMELINE

Key Dates	Actions
June 2, 2020	Introduce Ordinance with proposed sewer service rate and set Public Hearing for July 21, 2020.
June 5, 2020	Send Proposition 218 notice (45 days prior to public hearing) to property owners with proposed rate.
July 21, 2020	Hold public hearing, adopt Ordinance setting rate, and adopt FY 2020-21 Sewer Service Charges Report based on the adopted rate.
