To Sail or Not to Sail . . .

Month two of the Shelter-in Place begins, and it continues to affect each and every one of us in ways that we had no way of anticipating.

There have been a lot of questions asked about whether it's OK to take a boat out. First and foremost, we encourage all Marina tenants to obey San Mateo County's Shelter in place order. Information about that order can be found here: https://www.smcgov.org/shelter-place-faqs

The Marina continues to be partially open, and tenants have access to their boats. It turns out that maintaining social distance around the Marina is not terribly difficult. The docks are wide with plenty of places to step aside and let others pass more than six feet away.

Latitude 38 had a thoughtful article about boating on San Francisco Bay during this pandemic. It's up to each boat owner to interpret the relevant shelter in place order(s) and decide whether it's OK to take their boat out. The Bay has a lot of different agencies with overlapping jurisdictions. Here is an excerpt:

"We can't imagine everyone's unique situation with their sailboat, so we do think it's possible you can sail or work on your boat. Think about it in the same way you might go for a bike ride, or if working on your boat is like working in your back yard. That said, we think people should be thinking about the 'spirit' of the guidance rather than the letter of the law. Our public servants, doctors, nurses and hospitals are straining under the looming threat. They're asking us all to take a break for just a few weeks. It's sunny, it's springtime, and it's frustrating. Yet nobody wants to put more strain on those who are charged with our care or whose care we may need."
