The Little Heron

We are all familiar with the Great Blue Herons that frequent our shores, and we often see Crowned Night Herons nesting in the trees on the center berm. But the smaller and quite elegant Green Heron is less common and has been sighted from time to time in the area of docks 22 to 25. These smaller birds have iridescent green backs, and forage mostly by standing still or stalking very slowly at the edge of shallow water, waiting for prey to approach. They are one of the few bird species that use tools, dropping a feather or small twig on surface of water to lure fish within striking distance.
