Policy Decision

WHAT THE CITY IS DOING TO ADDRESS HOUSING CHALLENGES

INCREASING AFFORDABLE HOUSING

- Changed City planning guidelines for Downtown to allow 2500 new units, including at least 375 affordable homes
- Funded developments, such as 707 Bradford Street, which provides 117 new affordable rental homes
- Made it easier for homeowners to build second units

PRESERVING & IMPROVING EXISTING AFFORDABLE HOMES

- Provided money to preserve 87 affordable homes in our community
- Offering property improvement loans for buildings with mostly low-income tenants

INCREASING AFFORDABLE HOUSING IN THE COMMUNITY



Require affordable housing in new housing developments to be...

5 - 20% affordable



NEW RULES TO SUPPORT RENTERS



MINIMUM LEASE TERMS

Landlords must provide at least a 12 month lease.

Rents can only be increased after the 12 month lease ends.



RELOCATION ASSISTANCE

If a landlord evicts a renter, under certain

situations, they must provide renter with money equal to 3 months rent.

*These new policies will take effect in January 2019. Relocation Assistance: If a landlord evicts a renter under certain circumstances, including taking the property off the market, renovation/remodeling, etc. they must provide that renter with money equal to three months rent.

OTHER ITEMS UNDER CONSIDERATION

- Require new housing developments in Redwood City to include some affordable units, or to pay fees that go toward affordable housing (at May 21 City Council meeting).
- Develop guidelines for how to allocate the City's affordable housing funds (May 22 community conversation and June 25 City Council meeting).
